

EXHIBITS POUR IN FOR ANNUAL FAIR DISPLAYS

Apparently spurred to increased interest in the Oregon state fair this year by the thousands of dollars worth of materials and labor that have gone into creating a rejuvenated fair plant, new and old exhibitors from all sections of the state are already sending in their entries in quantities that will assure record livestock, agricultural and home making shows days before the annual exhibition actually opens, on Labor day.

At the rate at which set-up for a host of new things at the grounds and in the buildings to draw the attention of exhibitors as well as the public generally, a number of innovations in the premium lists will contribute to the vigorous competition this year. As a paramount feature to those who vie for premiums, cash prizes have been increased so that they are now only slightly below the pre-war level.

For fowl, fish and bird fanciers, classifications have been enlarged, along with pen and aquarium space, so at least 4,000 head of these may be viewed in the new silver palace poultry pavilion, formerly the automobile building. Here 20 pens have been constructed by the state fair for the upland game exhibit by the Oregon game and fish commission, just as one of several new features.

A small building occupying space between the 4-H club exhibits and the agricultural building will be devoted entirely to federal exhibits of varied nature.

In the dairy products division will be found a new class—milk and cream. The dairy products show will be located in a really suitable display space this year for the first time, the new quarters being in the agricultural building. A plate glass front display booth for the egg show will be another new feature for both exhibitors and spectators. Incidentally, any poultryman or farmer would like to have \$5 for a dozen eggs. That sum is what the best dozen eggs from Oregon will bring at the fair.

Mrs. William Bell of Roseburg, superintendent of the art department, has written Director Gehlhar that she has actually had to turn down requests for added features in her department, so ready has been the response to the new sections here. The 1934 departures in this realm include a hobby fair, curios and antiques departments.

For the Future Farmers of America, a boys' vocational organization carried on through the high schools of the state, a cow and hen marathon will provide the dominant interest of the week. This department will be housed in the old poultry building, which is one of the structures which has had a complete "face lifting" operation since the last fair.

Boys and girls from the 4-H clubs of the state will have a banner exhibit this year, with \$4,300 cash in premiums and scholarships to be vied for, not to mention the \$1,265 cash the state fair pays to cover expenses of the 4-H participation.
