HOP FESTIVAL FEATURE WILL BE BIG RODEO

Independence—Plans for the hop festival took shape early this week when Archie Holt, rodeo promoter, and Buff Jones, celebrated ringmaster, were signed by the festival committee to give Independence a roundup show for three days during the festival. Daily prize money on the rodeo will total nearly \$200 to cowboys who will ride bareback, bronco bust, ride brahma steers and do trick riding and roping.

Gay Ray, prominent in rodeo circles as a clown, will be included in the daily performances as will Hank Finley, announcer.

The rodeo is believed to round up a program that will bring thousands of visitors to Independence during the celebration days. Under present plans August 30, Thursday will be devoted to the "hop festival" with the coronation of the queen, under the auspices of the Woman's club, a parade featuring all of the hop ranches and business houses of the community and an evening's program of dancing and music.

The afternoon of August 31, Friday, will be devoted to the opening day of the rodeo, with the entertainment expected to last nearly two hours.
