Bronze Marker To Be Placed

In accordance with the policy of its national organization, the Oregon State Society, United States Daughters of 1812, will place the official bronze marker of the society on the grave of John Taylor, a soldier in the War of 1812, next Sunday. The ceremony will be held at 2 o'clock in the Aumville cemetery, 14 miles southeast of Salem, and is open to the public.

Four great-grandchildren of John Taylor, Betty and Joan Taylor of Peoria and Robert and Prudence Craig, children of Dr. and Mrs. Dolph Craig of Salem, will assist in placing the marker and decorating the grave of their ancestor. Mrs. George H. Root, state president, will preside, and patriotic groups of Marion county will join in honoring the pioneer and soldier. Mrs. E. E. Bergman, past state president of the Daughters of Union Veterans, has invited the Daughters of 1812 to assemble at her home in Salem following the ceremony for an out-door luncheon.

John Taylor was born March 27, 1792, in Winchester, Va. He served with the Virginia militia under Captain David Vanmeter stationed at Norfolk and was in the engagement at Hampton Roads.
