GHOST TOWN OF ASHWOOD REVIVES

Madras, Aug. 13 (AP)—Ashwood, a "ghost town" for many years, may again revive the days when the famous "Oregon King" mine gave up fortunes in gold and silver.

The Oregon King, which more than 30 years ago was the center of a remarkable rush to the Ashwood country, has been leased by the Juneau Gold Mining company. A new shaft will be sunk, the old plant will be razed and modern machinery will be installed. The main camp probably will be in the community of Ashwood, rather than in the canyon below Skull Hollow, the location of the camp when the mine was closed by litigation in 1903.

TO EXEMPT TAXES ON \$3000 HOMES

An initiative petition for a proposed constitutional amendment to be voted on in 1936, calling for exemption of taxes for homesteaders, was filed with the secretary of state today by the Home Owners' Tax Exemption league.

The proposal provides that every homestead actually occupied by an owner should be exempt from taxation up to \$3000 cash value. Charles H. Ager is president of the league and Mrs. Carleton Kirby, secretary.

Charged with stealing sweet corn from a field, Tracy Mofford stood trial in justice court Monday afternoon. He previously had entered a plea of not guilty to the charge and was released on \$25 bail.

Representatives of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and of the American Legion were asked to get together and sponsor boxing matches in Salem upon a cooperative basis. At a meeting held Monday noon by members of the Salem Boxing commission, about a week ago the American Legion which has been conducting wrestling shows in the city, applied to the commission for a permit to stage boxing cards. Some time later the Veterans of a Foreign Wars applied for a similar permit. Monday the commission met with members of the two veterans organizations in an effort to reach a satisfactory basis upon which to operate. It is expected representatives from the veterans will confer and then hold a special session with the commission. The commission will reserve the right to fix the dates for boxing in order that they may not conflict with other sports events.

3 BEND FANS INJURED, CRASH

Four Bend baseball fans returning home after the baseball game here Sunday afternoon were injured, three of them seriously, when their automobile was crowded from the highway on the turn at the Midway service station five miles north of Jefferson.

Roy Ulrick, driver of the machine, is in the Albany hospital with a badly crushed leg. Others taken to the hospital were John Goodfellow and Hirschel Parks. Sam Riehl, the fourth passenger, was able to continue home after receiving first aid treatment for severe bruises. Ulrick told police that he turned too far off the highway to permit a southbound Greyhound stage to pass him and hit the loose gravel, losing control of his machine which crashed into a telephone pole. He said he did not believe the driver of the stage was aware of the accident. Salem and the immediate vicinity were unusually free of automobile accidents over the week-end, the one south of here being the only one of a serious nature. Mishaps occurring within the city limits were trivial and included F. K. Skilling, 1438 North Cottage and Gertrude Bakin, Chalmers at 15th and Center, and A. Morris, 1060, driver of a Stiff Furniture company truck and Frank Johnson, Salem Taxi company, with no location given on the police report.

ASTORIA EXPECTS 2000 LEGIONNAIRES

Astoria, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—More than 2000 Legionnaires were expected to attend the 1934 state convention of the American Legion here August 23, 24 and 25. J. C. Wright, chairman of the convention, said that the convention, which will be held at the Hotel Astoria, will be the largest ever held in the city. The convention program includes the semi-finals of the state baseball league, business sessions and a parade and fireworks for the first day; Commander Hayes' address, the baseball finals and state bathing beauty and drum corps contests for the second, and election of officers for the third day.

GANGSTERS RUN RIOT IN CHICAGO AS GUNS BLAZE

Chicago, Aug. 13 (AP)—Crime rode high in Chicago headlines this week-end, as gangland's guns blazed as ruthlessly as in the days of Al Capone.

But the cold precision which marked a "job" of the former liquor syndicate was missing—with one man back from a "one way" ride, another victim still alive with five bullets in his body, and a bystander critically wounded by a stray bullet.

The latest victim was Jerry Pilot, alias Stevens, 29, reputed former bootlegger, who was shot five times in a southside tavern early today. While three companions walked a man covered his face with a handkerchief, walked over to Pilot's table and emptied his revolver, while other patrons scurried for shelter. Still alive, with two bullets in his head, one in the abdomen, and others in an arm and leg, Pilot was carried out to an automobile, after his assailants had fled.

But suddenly a small dark sedan glided past, and gunfire erupted from it as the would-be assassin tried to finish him. John Sandrik, 23, Whiting, Ind., who was walking from a girl friend's home to a street car, crossed the line of fire and dropped critically wounded with a bullet in his abdomen and another in his leg.

Pilot was the fourth gang victim in Chicago since Saturday morning. The first was Constable John Griffin of suburban Bellwood, who lived to tell about his "ride" although five bullets struck him.

Another victim was Robert (Pudgy) Stamm, 35, garage floorman, who was slain today by two men who entered the garage and opened fire on him after a short argument. Stamm pleaded guilty six years ago and served a prison sentence on a manslaughter charge. In 1924 Stamm was shot five times, but refused to name his assailants. Tony Imperato, 35, a former bell boy on a lake steamer, was the other "ride" victim. His body was found in an alley yesterday, his head torn by a charge from a shotgun.

JOSEPH QUINN HELD IN SHOOTING AFFRAY

Joseph Quinn is being held on an open charge for investigation as a result of a shooting about 2 o'clock Sunday morning during which Jess Baldwin, said to be a close friend, was wounded in the arm. Police state that five shots were fired.

Stories of the two men vary. According to Quinn he had sold the gun to Baldwin and when the latter attempted to hold up a couple of pedestrians on North Liberty street, he objected and in the attempt to wrest the gun from Baldwin the shots were fired.

Baldwin denies he had any thought of a holdup, but told the officers Quinn shot him after he, Baldwin, had been robbed of about \$30 by Quinn. The money described by Baldwin was found in the possession of Quinn when he was arrested.

Howard Maple, who has been catching for the Harrisburg baseball team of the Pennsylvania State league, will be recalled by the Boston National league club for tonight's play, according to information received here by Coach R. S. Keene of Willamette university. Maple had originally planned to report at Willamette September 10 to assist Coach Keene. It will be around the first of October, however, before he reaches Salem.

VIOLATIONS OF NRA CHARGED IN U. S. COURTS

Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—Bills of complaint alleging violations of the national recovery act were filed in federal court here today against a brewery in Tacoma, with a local agency, and against three service stations in Portland.

The complaints were filed by Carl C. Donaghy, United States attorney for Oregon, and were delivered to Federal Judge John H. McNary.

The bills of complaint charged violation of the code of fair competition, and requested orders to show cause why the defendants should not be punished under the statutes. Hearings were set for Sept. 3.

The brewery named in the complaint was the Northwest Breweries, Inc., of Tacoma. It was charged that a Portland Inn on Feb. 27, last, purchased ten half-barrels of beer from the brewery for the established price, and was given, free, two one-half barrels, in violation of the code section governing rebates.

In the case of the three service stations, it was charged that each sold first structure gasoline at 20 cents a gallon, two cents under the established code price. Those named were the Portland Super-Service station, the Rotoway Service station and the Globe Service station.

The four cases were the first of their kind instituted in this judicial district.

PIONEER CLAN'S ANNUAL PICNIC

Members of the Irving-Claggett clan of Oregon held their annual reunion Sunday.

More than 60 members of the clan attended the dinner which was served at the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Claggett north of Salem.

During the morning the clan visited the Jason Lee mission cemetery to dedicate a monument erected to the memory of Margaret Hadley Irvine, grandmother of the clan, who crossed the plains from Kent, Utah, in 1852 and whose death occurred on the day after the family reached their destination on the banks of the Willamette river at the site of what is now the city of Salem.

Among those attending the reunion were Mrs. Elizabeth Claggett Kerns, 87, of Eugene and Samuel Irvine, 85, of Salem, both members of the wagon train which crossed the plains in 1852.

Others attending were U. S. Senator Charles L. McNary of Salem, Federal Judge John H. McNary of Portland; Milton A. Miller of Portland, U. S. Internal revenue collector, and B. P. Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal, Portland, who delivered the dedicatory address.

SILVERMAN FILES AS INDEPENDENT

Abraham M. Silverman, Portland, has been advised by P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state, of receipt of the certificate of an assembly of electors held in Portland May 24 evidencing his nomination for the office of governor as an independent candidate.

Mr. Silverman, who was here today, stated that up to the time of the primaries he had no intention of becoming a candidate for governor and would not have been had Willis Mahoney gained the democratic nomination. He states he has become a candidate and will run upon the platform adopted by Mr. Mahoney when a candidate.

Mr. Silverman has been a resident of Oregon for 24 years, was a candidate for city commissioner in Portland two years ago and for county commissioner of Multnomah county before the last primary in which he received a substantial vote. He states he will make an active campaign.

Two runaway Portland boys were picked up here Monday by the state police and are being held for the city authorities.

Fire Drives Farmers Families From Homes

Grants Pass Aug. 13 (AP)—Driven out by the menace of a forest fire sweeping through second growth timber 15 families south of the Murphy-Provost road stood guard by their hastily-moved household goods during the night as state fire wardens completed a trail around the four-mile-long blaze.

The first started about 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon seven miles south of here and was driven eastward by a steady wind. It was not definitely checked this morning.

30 CENT MEALS IN RESTAURANTS

Patrons of the lower price restaurants will be asked to pay a nickel more for their meals beginning next Wednesday, according to a decision reached by operators at a meeting held recently.

Establishments where higher prices have been in effect will not be affected by the tilling of meal charges. Restaurants which have been asking 25 cents will charge 30 cents.

While the two bit meal is the only one which the order affects, it is likely further increases will be made if food costs continue their upward trend.

The smaller restaurant proprietor has been losing money and as a result has been unable to meet his bills, one operator said today. "Getting of food costs prices has resulted in increased costs of materials to the restaurant owner and if he is to continue in business he will have to get more for the meals he serves."

It is understood further increases depend upon whether food stuffs advance in price or remain at the present level.

Coffee at five cents per cup will still be available, it is understood, the restaurant men making no move to advance the price to a dime as has been rumored.

STATES TO DISCUSS JOINT ROAD ACTION

A joint session between the Oregon highway commission and Oregon Morrow, director of highways in Washington, was tentatively set for Portland next Friday, August 17, it was announced here today by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

Two matters in which both states are jointly interested will be considered at the meeting. One is the request for the two states to take over the operation of the Columbia river ferry at Astoria, now operated by private firms, and the establishment of a Port of Entry between Vancouver and Portland.

The Port of Entry proposal, advanced by Morrow, would provide all trucks and buses operating in both states check in at the established station. Officials could then determine if the motor vehicles were conforming to all laws of both states.

PREACHER SAYS LORD CURE FOR RATTLESNAKES

Erastus, N. C., Aug. 13 (AP)—Albert Teester, hill Billy evangelist who permitted a rattlesnake to bite him twice and then refused medical attention because "the faithful are immune to death," was confident today he had proved to his flock "God is the best physician."

Surrounded by his five children, his 41-year-old brother, Robert, and his 65-year-old sister, Mary, Teester told with solemn pride how he "licked the serpent with the most powerful of all weapons—faith in the Lord."

The arm which the snake's fangs penetrated twice before the eyes of his congregation a week ago Sunday was still swollen today but appeared much improved.

"It'll be all right in a few more days," he drawled. "Then I'm going back to my farm."

Teester, sturdy mountaineer, arose from the bed where for several days he had tossed in agony, and walked nine miles yesterday over the winding trails of the great smokies to deliver two sermons.

"I'll take the word of God today and preach on it," the 39-year-old "holiness" preacher told his flock, augmented by mountain folk of other sects who had come to witness the "miracle." "I want to tell you and I want it to go out to all the world just why I picked up a serpent and let it bite me Sunday."

"I'm doing this for God and I explain from His book. In the name of Jesus I took up the snake and let it bite me. I have the best physician in all the world. I'll tell you who it is. It is Jesus Christ."

A horse cry of "Hallelujah, praise the Lord," interrupted.

"I will never need
