

BUTTER PRICE ADVANCES IN DAY'S TRADING

Portland, Aug. 21 (UP)—Butter prices advanced one cent today; standards and prime firsts were up one-half cent, and firsts jumped one and one-half cents a pound. Butterfat was lifted at least one cent.

Trading in the local egg market is firmer with almost general advances in list prices.

Santoprice spots are shown for cauliflower because of quality deterioration. Quality in general is not up to the average of recent years which has hurt consumption somewhat.

Demand for best quality tomatoes is firmly held as the price for the ordinary to good stuff, which forms the major portion of the supply is selling generally below code figure.

Good demand is showing for peaches but chiefly for The Dalles and Willamette valley offerings.

Country killed hog prices are generally at least closely following the advances made in the local livestock market yesterday with sales reported to be 13c for light butchers.

Dressed veal continues very firm and at full prices with not enough coming in to fill demand. Dressed lambs are moving out well at late prices.

Late pears are beginning to appear but the public is still after the disappearing Bartletts.

Potatoes and onions are generally without price change. Huckleberries are finding a fair call around 7-8c lb.

PRUNE HARVEST NEARS FINISH

The prune harvest in this district is expected to be pretty well over by this week with indications that every prune will be saved. This will be largely due to the heavy rain tomatoes taken in by the canneries which are putting on one of the biggest packs in history in this district.

In drying it is reported that the sizes are coming out a little disappointing, a report from the hills stating that the average is running about 48 to 50 points which possibly is about five points smaller than was expected. But the quality is said to be fine and the crop large and now it is hoped that Germany will loosen up and take on its share of the buying which will materially aid the situation from a marketing standpoint.

MINISTER HAS BIG TOMATOES

Silverton—Rev. W. O. Livingstone of the Silverton Christian church, is a tomato grower as well as a minister, and he wonders if he is any bigger and better story than he can truthfully furnish in respect to size.

He has 36 plants, 24 of the Oregon Special variety, and 12 of the Marglobe, a new tomato. The plants are trained upon a three foot wire framework and average well over 8 1/2 inches in height, with the stems an inch and a half in diameter after the plants are in conjunction with the wire supports. Near the ground, the plants are small in diameter. The tomatoes, ripened, run from three and a half to six inches in diameter and are round and smooth. The Marglobes are a meaty variety with scarcely no seeds. Two thirds of the large plants now have from fifty to fifty-five tomatoes, large ripe and green, small growing green ones, and numerous blossoms.

Livingstone said that he makes it a practice to allow the plants to grow very large before setting them in the ground of the garden from the boxes, and that he places them 12 or 14 inches deep in the ground, removing practically all the leaves at the time of transplanting.

NEW SPRAYING METHOD QUICKER

Seattle, Aug. 21 (AP)—A new method of testing for the residue of lead left after spraying fruit for insect control which produces results in about half an hour instead of the three days needed by the old method was announced today by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The apparatus is simple and the tests will be less expensive, a department bulletin said. "The new test is also being conducted by several chemists in connection with regulatory control of sprayed fruits under the federal pure-food law."

The new method, which the bulletin did not describe, was developed by H. J. Wichman and associates in the food control laboratory of the federal food and drug administration.

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND EASTSIDE MARKET
Portland, Aug. 21 (UP)—Supply of tomatoes was rather short during the Tuesday session of the outside market. A few wholesalers market. Prices were firm and in spots higher with the best quality at 10c better than the minimum allowed by the code while the high point was 10c better than the market. The buyer offered 10c-10 1/2c for standard and 11c for extra. There was also a good tone in the cauliflower market for Oregon stuff and even Yakimas sold more generally at the code minimum although a few buyers were willing to pay 11c-11 1/2c for standards and 11c for extra.

An attempt was made by a local concern to get a corner on fresh prunes offering but growers were wary and few were willing to sell before the market opened. The buyer offered 25c but inside the market 30c-35c was obtained, the latter in a limited way. Corn market was active but prices held around 90-95c generally, few 80-85c, one lot 81c sack for 5c and 6c. Celery market unchanged except for a few white bunches generally down to 90c doz. bunches, although 81c was obtained for some.

Peas—Northern 4-5c, extra 5-6c. Onions—Available, Yakimas continued to drag.

Some Lima beans offered 3 1/2c in the shell and 10c lb. shelled. Peppers unchanged, mostly 25c per bushel for green and red around 30-35c.

Lettuce unchanged, much northern junk arriving, but the trade is paying more for it than for most local.

Chinese lettuce continued 11-12c per crate. Spinach easier, mostly 75c or 80c per crate. Onions nominally 50c per bushel.

Strawberries 11-10-8c, raspberries 40-45c, blueberries 50-55c, currants 40-45c, Concord type grapes 50c per bushel. General prices ruled:
