SCIO ADOPTS SCHOOL BUDGET

Scio—The school budget for district 95, including Scio, was adopted Friday at the called meeting as prepared by the board of directors. The budget contemplates total expenditures for the present school year, which began on the third Monday of last June, of \$11,640, with total receipts estimated at \$8,212.08. The difference, \$3,427.92, is to be raised by district tax. The sum of \$10 was included for health nurse work during the school year. There is said to be no outstanding bonded indebtedness against the district. The schools of the city are scheduled to open Monday, September 17.

Thousands Throng Into Little Riverside Town As Hop Festival Opens

Trucks-loads of wild horses arrived yesterday and are being stabled near the arena.

The Higgins-Cavell fight, the coronation of the queen and the rodeo will be the stellar attractions of the festival. Airplane stunts, carnival, parades with real floats, all add to the occasion.

The big parade was to start at 2:15 o'clock today following the coronation of the queen. Miss Marjorie Plant of the Wigwag ranch was crowned as queen, attended by Miss Beryl Kelley and Babe Hudson as princesses. G. B. Kelley was in charge of arrangements for the parade which formed on Third street at 1:30 p. m., winding up at the bowl.

Each afternoon of the festival airplanes will soar over Independence taking passengers for rides and doing stunts. Two parachute leaps will add to this feature.

The carnival grounds, located at C and Second streets are open, with Browning Carnival company ready to give rides to the children and others who desire that pleasure. Other concessions on the grounds have been granted, and the committee on arrangements will see to it that there is no gambling carried on.

Dancing at the big open air pavilion will be an added attraction every evening.
