

BETTER WALKS ARE DEMANDED BY SCIO DADS

Scio—The appropriate committee was instructed by the town council at the regular September meeting to repair sidewalks in the city where needed, giving special attention to that section leading west to the school house, which was reported in bad condition.

"You have to be something of an acrobat to negotiate the crossing in the vicinity of the E. C. Shelton property during the rainy season," Councilman Bryan said in presenting the need of a crosswalk of some kind at that point, indicating the locality recently vacated by Gail Evans.

Pursuant to instructions this committee met Monday night and presented a budget for the current year, which was adopted and turned over to the town council at an adjourned session at that time.
