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SCIO SCHOOLS TO GET START EARLY MONDAY

Scio—When Scio schools reconvene next Monday, at the close of the summer vacation, one new instructor in the high school will greet the students in that department. Cecil Elder, a nephew of Mrs. Riley Shelton of Scio, is the only new face in the teaching staff in the high school.

F. A. Galleghy, B.A., will enter upon his eighth year as principal of the high school here. In addition to his work in a general supervisory capacity as principal, Galleghy again will handle mathematics in the high school.

Miss Doris Neptune of Salem, who has taught here several years, will be at her post in the commercial department, teaching sewing in connection with her other duties as instructor.

Miss Bernice Newhouse of Newberg has been retained as instructor in English and foreign languages in the high school. This will be her third year at Scio.

Cecil Elder of Shedd is a graduate of Albany college and will teach science and history and also officiate as high school coach. Elder is new as a teacher of classes but has had considerable successful experience as a coach, it is said.

In the grade department, E. P. Caldwell, veteran of the seventh and eighth grades here, will enter upon his ninth year in that capacity. Many of Caldwell's graduates have also completed the high school course in this city during his work here.

The other three teachers in the grades are new to the work here but all have had teaching experience except the primary teacher, Miss Blanche Johnson.

Fourth of Candidates Placed Upon Ticket After The Primaries

More than one-fourth of the state and district candidates whose names will appear on the November 6 ballot in Oregon were placed in nomination after the regular primaries of last May. It was recorded at the close of filing here last night. Sixty-seven names were received, either by nomination of assemblies, conventions or by central committees to the regular 191 nominees.

Possibility of several more which may be named by petition up to September 21 and listed. These would only be for district offices. It was indicated, since it was known no state-wide petitions are in circulation. For state offices two per cent of the number who cast votes for the last presidential electors are required to nominate by petition while three per cent is necessary for district offices.

Most of the new candidates are independents, with the exception of a group of so-called communists and a group of socialists. The state and district lists include candidates for congress, state offices, state legislature, judicial positions and district attorneys. County and city candidates are not required to file with the secretary of state.

The race for governorship was reduced to six at 5 o'clock last night when the secretary of state failed to receive a corrected certificate of nomination for H. H. Stallard of Portland. Several other certificates listed as received are in the hands of the attorney general but unless he rejects them, they will be listed as filed. Among the latter are those of J. E. Bennett, Portland, independent for congress from the third district, and the list of communists.

The list for governor therefore includes Joe E. Dunne, republican; Charles H. Martin, democrat; Peter Zimmerman, progressive-independent; H. E. Wirth, independent-liberal; A. M. Silverman, independent; Harry J. Correll, communist. Four candidates seek election to congress from the first district: James W. Mott, republican; R. R.

tendent of public instruction and labor commissioner respectively to oppose the regular nominees.

Other candidates filed for state senator in the second, third, fourth, twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth and seventh districts. In the latter district, T. R. Gillenwaters and N. G. Wallace were named by central committees for the seat vacated by Jay H. Upton in the senate.

Twenty-six new candidates filed for the 13 seats in the house from Multnomah county. Filings were also listed for seats in the lower branch of the legislature from the first, sixth, seventh and fourteenth districts. District attorney nominees were added in Multnomah, Jefferson, Walla and Linn counties.
