

HOLD KIDNAPING A ONE MAN JOB

TYPHOON HITS CENTRAL JAPAN 1346 LOSE LIFE

Over 4203 Injured—Millions In Property Destroyed—Tidal Wave Center of Japan's Industrial District Swept by 120 Mile Gale

Tokyo, Sept. 21 (AP)—At least 1346 persons were killed and 4,203 injured today by a typhoon which roared across western and central Japan from Nagasaki to Nagano. The steadily mounting toll of casualties indicated that hundreds of persons were missing. No immediate estimate could be made of the property damage, but it was obvious that it would amount to millions of dollars.

3 TINY PIN HOLES CONNECTING LINK WITH KIDNAPING

Ransom Letters Evidently Written and Punctured at Same Time Giving Proof That Hauptmann Was Actual Kidnaper As Well As Receiver Of Ransom Money
