

# WILLAMETTE AND OREGON STATE READY FOR TEST

## HARD CONTEST EXPECTED BY COACH KEENE

With Oregon State pointing for the contest and with Willamette's team in excellent physical condition, indications point to a real football game Saturday afternoon at Corvallis when the Beavers and Beards meet on Bell field at 1:30 o'clock. It will be the first contest of the season for each squad. Following the game with Willamette, Oregon State will engage Pacific University.

Coach Keene, usually of a pessimistic turn of mind, declared before members of the Salem Breakfast club Friday morning that if Coach Stiner plays his starting team of "iron men" throughout the entire 60 minutes, "Willamette will give them a real ball game." However, he added, if Oregon State plays 45 men against his team, he could match Stiner in the matter of reserves.

Coach Keene's team will have a wider variety of plays when it takes the field against Oregon State than has been the case heretofore. Scrimmaging has been harder this fall, in fact this type of play was resorted to the second day after the players were called together. No serious injuries have resulted and it is expected the team will go against the Orangemen in first class condition.

The starting lineup for Willamette will probably consist of McAdams and Versteeg, ends; Weisner and Balkovic, tackles; Hoyt and Gramis, guards; Connors, center; Franz, Cannady, Brandon and Weisgerber in the backfield.

McAdams and Versteeg are playing their second year at Willamette and lack experience to some extent. The balance of the line are old heads at the game. Hoyt, although somewhat small for a guard, makes up in fight what he lacks in weight and is a hard man to take out.

In the backfield, Dick Weisgerber, fullback from New Jersey will be playing his first game of collegiate football. He has performed well in practice and handles himself well. Franz will do the signal calling and kicking.

The return of Don Mills to the campus Thursday after an absence of several days due to illness, improves the situation in the backfield. Although somewhat weak it is expected he will play at least a quarter of the game.

"Red" Franklin, all-coast halfback, will constitute the main scoring threat on the part of Oregon State.

The O.S.C. starting lineup as announced by Coach Stiner consists of Woody Joslin and Schultz, ends; Hall and Brown, tackles; Tomcheck and Woerner, guards; Devine, center; Pangle, quarterback; Franklin and Swanson, halfbacks and Helkenen, fullback.

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## FIRPO BATTLES HENRY LEWIS 10 ROUND DRAW

Portland, Sept. 21 (AP)—Young Firpo continued to rule today over Pacific coast light-heavyweight fighters after coming out of 10 rounds by a heavy body bombardment of Henry Lewis in an outdoor show here last night.

Lewis, Phoenix negro recently named by the National Boxing Association as one of the world's best 175-pounders, averted defeat only by a heavy body bombardment of Firpo in the final round.

The Burke, Idaho, boy who recently defended his championship against Tiger Jack Fox of Indianapolis, was content to let the fight go as it would in the early rounds, during which Lewis gained a slight advantage.

In the sixth round Firpo began to open up and by the seventh his unorthodox punches were landing heavily. During the eighth and ninth rounds he bludgeoned out a lead with an aggressive show of rights and lefts to the body and chin.

**RDCORD CROWD AT HEAVYWEIGHT BOUT**  
Chicago, Sept. 21 (AP)—The realm of wrestling appeared to be ruled today by Jim London of Kooptod, Greece.

The 37-year old Greek reportedly proved his right to the world's heavyweight wrestling championship last night before 35,265 wrestling fans at Wrigley field by throwing Ed (Strangler) Lewis, of Beverly Hills, Calif., who has held the title five times during his 25 year career, in a one-fall match.

London, weighing 205 pounds, pinned his bigger rival in 40 minutes 27 seconds with a hammerlock and three-quarter Nelson.

"Iron Mike" Mikulak, Oregon fullback, plunged over the Beaver goal for a touchdown. The teams lined up for the try for point. John Milligan, Oregon's expert kicker, was rushed into the game. His kick was perfect. Just as the ball was about to sail high over the players' heads, a huge figure fully twelve feet tall rose up and smashed the ball to the ground. "Tar" Schwammit, State's tackle, had hoisted 6'6" Clyde Devine on the shoulders of 6'2" Harry Fields, directly in the path of the ball.

**SENSATIONAL ONE HANDED CATCH**  
Washington State vs. California 1933 at Pullman.  
After Phil Sarboe, Cougar quarterback, had twice passed to Ted Christoffersen for substantial gains early in the second period, placing the pigskin on the California 21 yard line, Sarboe faded back on third down and heaved a 13 yard pass again to Christoffersen.
