

LIFE OF ARABS TOLD TO LIONS AT CLUB LUNCH

Monmouth—Mrs. Pearl Heath told the Lions at the weekly noon luncheon of her recent trip to the Middle East. She was gone about 30 days, going by automobile from Monmouth to New York in 80 hours of driving. In New York she boarded a tramp freighter for Casa Blanca.

There were something like a dozen passengers aboard the ship, most of them from Philadelphia. They had good cabins and meals although the boat did not cater to passengers. When the destination was reached the passengers went ashore while the freighter discharged and took on fresh cargo.

Mrs. Heath found the Arab population of the Barbary states picturesque but dirty. The Arabs wear three shirts under the reasoning that the more clothing worn, the harder for the heat to penetrate. Mrs. Heath supposed they wear three shirts because the neckbands indicate it, rising on the neck in parallel folds. The inner shirt is white, the second green and the outer white. Under these are worn peculiar pants, hanging behind and extending to the knees. Over all is worn a cotton toga. The poorer Arabs wear clothing of sack cloth.

The women also wear robes but have their faces covered with the exception of an oval slot for the eyes. Married women have a many on each side of the nose and unmarried women are minus this distinction. Religious differences are advertised by wearing the turban of red. Some, evidently politicians, wear both at one time. The Arabs loose change, dagger, or driver's license is carried in his girdle, which is pickpocket-proof. The women carry to find his property ready within the girdle folds, but no one else could.

The shops of the Algerian towns are about as large as a big drygoods box. Neither proprietor nor customer enters the store. The storekeeper never expects to have his first price recognized. The customer soon learns when the bottom price is reached and Mrs. Heath said purchasing by the Arab method has a thrill of its own.

Everything connected with the Arabs, asserted Mrs. Heath, is beautifully artistic and gorgeously dirty. In making bread they use no kneading board but flatten it out on the ground where it is handy. The bread is baked in hard discs which are stacked up in the markets and possibly the family cat guards the stack from thieves by sleeping on it. After a day's mingling with Arabs, Mrs. Heath said they washed their hands repeatedly to make sure they were presentable.

Bongers were numerous in their shops, and persistent in aims seeking, but they could be discouraged, which is more than can be said of the Spanish. Spanish Maghars were especially vexatious, declared Mrs. Heath, and persisted in obstructing their presence on any and all occasions.

They made a special trip to Granada and saw the Alhambra, a wonderful experience. They also visited Seville. In Spain they were interested in Spanish pottery, one of the reasons for the trip and found much of interest in them. Mrs. Heath said her art stood her in good stead once. In an Arab town she became separated from her companions, and with a brief time to reach the boat, could think of no word for it but could be understood. Finally she took a pencil and drew a picture of a boat, which was instantly recognized and the taxi driver got her to her destination.

The return voyage was attended by favorable skies and the journey from Europe to America, expected to take 15 days was shortened to 13 days. Her boat fare was about \$300 incident expenses \$200, and automobile to New York and back about \$100.
