

SILVERTON HAS ARMISTICE DAY PATRIOTIC TALK

Silverton - "The greatest assurance of peace is a trained citizenry," stated Dr. W. F. Milliken of Portland, in his address at the armistice Monday in the Armistice service. Dr. Milliken is president of the Western Baptist association and is religious educational instructor of the association. The speaker paid a special tribute to the real worth of the man, Washington, as he was in life and not as the portraits show him.

Roy Davenport, commander of the Silverton post of the American Legion was master of ceremonies. Those introduced from the speaker's platform were Jerry DeSart, commander of the Silverton post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars; Mrs. James Scarth, president of the American Legion Auxiliary; Mrs. Scott McPike, president of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary; Mrs. Frank Fournier of the Salem Veterans of Foreign Wars; and Mrs. Rebecca Mather, aged 92 years, the only living charter member of the Silverton order of Women's Relief Corps. This organization was begun during General Grant's term of presidency, stated Mrs. Mount.
