STUDENTS FIND ANCIENT BONES

A skeleton of an Indian at least 300 years old, was unearthed yesterday from a burial mound east of Harrisburg in Linn county, by students from Willamette university, headed by Dr. E. B. Laughlin, professor of sociology and anthropology, members of the party reported today.

Numerous aboriginal artifacts were found in the burial place. The estimate of the age of the skeleton was based on the growth of an oak tree, over 300 years old, growing immediately above the grave. Further study of the bones probably will give better evidence as to their age and relationship to the early history of the region, it was said.

Yesterday's expedition was one in several carried on at Willamette university in the interests of unearthing new facts regarding the early history of the Oregon country. Two other skeletons previously were unearthed in the same vicinity.

FATHER OF GIRL READY TO PAY

New York, Nov. 13 (AP)—Frankly stumped, but still hoping, Alfred E. Distelhurst today declared he could do nothing but wait for the abduction of his six year old daughter to make the next move. The bewildered father said:

"I can do nothing now—simply wait for my child's captors to get in touch with me. I can't tell how long it will remain here. But it will be until I get some word."

"There have been no developments which would indicate the whereabouts or safety of his kidnapped daughter, Dorothy Ann, since he received the ransom letter which brought him from his Nashville, Tenn., home to keep a New York rendezvous with the kidnappers. It was simply a case of groping about in the dark, he said adding: "We have no suspicions. I just want to get in touch with one party—the party who wrote the letters to me."

Distelhurst, fairly well-to-do sales manager of a Nashville publishing firm, firmly clings to the belief that Dorothy Ann is alive and well, and that the kidnappers who snatched her as she walked home from her school in Nashville last September 17 brought her to New York.

Distelhurst disclosed details of missives received from the kidnappers who want \$5000 for the child's return.

FURTHER PARLEYS ON DEBTS REFUSED

London, Nov. 13 (AP)—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald told the House of Commons today that despite the failure of the allied nations to reach a new debt accord after the virtual wiping out of the German war debt, he had no intention of calling a new conference to deal with the matter.

The British government head made his statement after William Mabane, liberal leader in parliament, reminded him that as chairman of the Lausanne debt conference MacDonald had declared his intention to call a new debt conference "if no settlement could be obtained on their own debt (with the United States) by the creditor governments."

"I do not consider," said the prime minister, "that circumstances calling for a new conference have arisen and it is not my intention to call such a conference."

He assured the house that any fear that "Europe may one day find itself back on the Young plan" was unwarranted.

STATE MAY GET FLAX COIN BACK

Reimbursement to Oregon of previous appropriations made as "loans" to the state flax industry was recommended today by auditors who have completed a report of the state's flax interests.

The money would replenish the general fund of the state and reduce the existing deficit if action recommended by the auditors would be taken by the legislature, it was claimed.

The flax industry, as of June 30, 1934, had cash on hand of \$231,313, plus inventories and accounts receivable of \$165,000. Auditors recommended that a portion of the repayable advances of \$406,443 be returned to the state's general fund.

Waiving of accrued interest of \$47,907 was recommended for the cash payment was advised by the auditors. No specific amount of repayment was given, although the figure of \$100,000 has been suggested.

CIVIL SERVICE BOARD ELECTS

At a special meeting of the Salem civil service commission today Arthur H. Moore was elected chairman. Lloyd T. Ridgdon, who also held the office of chairman, A. A. Gueffroy was elected to succeed Ridgdon on the commission by the city council two weeks ago.

The commission today declared vacant the fire department position formerly held by H. O. Ray, who disappeared from Salem recently. Glenn Shedeck was advanced to the vacancy.

MAIL JOB VITAL TO STATE LINE

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—The States Steamship company would be forced to discontinue service without its mail contract, postoffice department solicitors were told today as hearings on the company's contract to carry mail from Portland, Ore., to the Orient were concluded.

Alfred A. Hampson, counsel for the States company, said the people of the west coast are entitled to the help of the government in maintaining the service. He said it would be "a tragedy if the company is forced to stop by cancellation or material modification of the contract."

Paul Page, Jr., counsel for the government, told the tribunal that evidence brought out during the hearing had proved definitely that the service has no postal value.

"This service certainly is not worth the millions the government is paying," he said.

Page emphasized that the company's ships all will be obsolete when the contracts expire. He pointed out evidence showing that the company had made 26 per cent profit with the mail contract, but had failed to lay aside a fund for reconstruction and reconditioning of ships on expiration of the contracts.

FAKED KIDNAPING TRIAL CONCLUDED

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 13 (AP)—The government rested its case today against Rev. Ralph H. Askew, "Four Square Gospel" evangelist charged with using the mails, telegraph and telephone in an effort to collect \$25,000 when he allegedly faked his own kidnaping.

The government presented in federal court only three witnesses. The case against the accused pastor progressed rapidly, with swift selection of a jury. Rev. Askew was alleged to have plotted numerous methods in which to effect his own release, even to threatening to dynamite Angelus Temple, spiritual home of Althea Semple McPherson Hutton.

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Ponthoz Appointed Ambassador to U. S.

Brussels, Nov. 13 (AP)—The appointment of Count Robert Van der Straeten Ponthoz as Belgian ambassador to the United States was announced today by the foreign office.

Count Ponthoz is regarded by the foreign office as one of Belgium's most distinguished diplomats. At present he is minister to Denmark, and his career has extended to many countries, including Argentina.

DEVALUATION OF DOLLAR TO STOP

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—The Roosevelt administration today turned its back on further devaluation of the American dollar for the present in favor of continued conservative monetary policy.

That was the general interpretation placed on a treasury order removing restrictions against the movement of American capital or currency to foreign countries.

The move was believed to indicate the administration had little fear of possible inflation moves by this winter's congress.

Because of returning world confidence in the American dollar and American fiscal affairs, treasury officials said there was no longer need for barriers against the "flight of capital." The bars were erected nearly two years ago when formulation of the Roosevelt monetary policy was begun.

Effective today, Americans can, without government approval, send their currency or credit abroad and feel in foreign exchange, just as they could prior to the financial crisis of March, 1933.

"This order," Undersecretary of Treasury Thomas Jefferson Coolidge explained, "will permit people to take their money out of the country whenever they want to."

The foreign exchange restrictions which are lifted today have been generally unneeded in recent months. Because of growing world confidence in the American dollar more money has come here than has left. This is readily portrayed by the steady accumulation of world gold in the United States where stocks of the yellow metal have crossed the \$8,000,000,000 mark, a gain of more than a billion dollars since the start of the year.

MARTIN WATCHES BOARDS IN ACTION

Governor-elect Charles H. Martin accompanied Governor Julius L. Meier to Salem today and will visit departments and attend various board meetings to familiarize himself with the duties he will assume January 14.

He was scheduled to attend meetings of the board of control, the state land board and the state banking board. The governor is chairman of the board of control and ex-officio chairman and member of a great many other state boards and commissions.

NO NEW CHARGES IN LAMSON CASE

San Jose, Cal., Nov. 13 (AP)—Reports that new allegations are to be made by Dr. Frederick Proeschner, Santa Clara county pathologist, in the David Lamson murder case were denied here today by District Attorney Fred Thomas.

Thomas, however, still refused to say whether he will demand that Lamson be brought to trial the second time for the alleged murder of his wife, Alene.

Dr. Proeschner, at the county hospital told interviewers he knew nothing of new evidence.

Lamson, under death sentence, was granted a new trial by the state supreme court.

Thomas' only statement to date on the court's decision is that Lamson "probably" will be retried.

DRAINAGE DITCH PROJECT SUCCESS

With water dashing down with a big splash, a hole has been cut completely through in the Shelton ditch, part of the SERRA project for flood control in southeast Salem and environs. While the ditch has not been widened to full capacity it is expected it will take care of any normal water level which might come. It is expected crews will be working on the job until the first of the year or later.

County Engineer Swart states that Clark creek, extension of Davidson creek in Salem, has been finished through town.

Shelton ditch is still to be made wider and deeper in many places. The city expects to put its shovel in above 25th street and cut out the bends between there and the city limits. Work will continue on also for three miles upstream, widening the ditch, taking out bends and removing small islands from the stream.

Work on the upper permanent diversion dam near Durbin's is expected to start this week. This will be a concrete structure to regulate overflow. The wooden diversion dam lower down put in as an experimental dam was finished some time since and has been in use.

SHORTAGE IN TURKEYS

Idaho Falls, Ida. (AP)—Idaho turkeys, famous for their mouth-watering qualities around Thanksgiving time, will be fewer this year, a survey by the University of Idaho reveals. Production this year will be only 82 per cent of the 1933 "harvest," it was reported.

BABY CHEATS DEATH

Lima, O. (AP)—Howard Winterman, Jr., 17-month-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Howard Winterman, escaped death recently when he fell from the second story window of his parents' home. A window screen gave way before the child's weight. He suffered various injuries.

MODERNIZATION PLAN COMPLETE ON COURT HOUSE

Floor plans and elevations for modernization of the old house on the court house lawn have been completed, it was announced today, and the work of renovating the historic old structure will begin shortly.

Clyde Van Patton, chairman of the planning committee, was to meet with the architects today for final agreement on some details.

It was part of the plan of the Marion County Housing committee that the old house stand for some time in its state of disrepair, so the public might become entirely familiar with it the better to appreciate renovation possibilities under the federal housing act when the old building has been altered into a modern home.

At a meeting of committee heads today C. E. Wilson, chairman of the committee conducting a city-wide canvass of housing needs, reported the canvass would be actively under way tomorrow. A second school of instruction for the canvassers was being held today with Mrs. David Wright and Mrs. Ira Darby, doing the instructing. The city has been divided into 36 districts for the purpose, and there are 36 workers to make the canvass, almost half of whom are women. They have been taken from the SERRA lists.

The canvass will be pushed vigorously tomorrow. Then Thursday afternoon all will meet at the chamber of commerce for an experience meeting, and the canvass will be continued in the afternoon.

At today's committee meeting it was reported that housing loans now made or approved by the local banks total \$16,437. The total is gradually increasing each week.

SAYS FEARS FOR FUTURE MYTHS

This nation need have no fear for the future if the same high type of laymen of other churches take the interest in church affairs as shown by those attending the convention of the Episcopal church held in Atlantic City, N. Y., Rev. George Swift, rector of the Episcopal church here, told the Kiwanis club Tuesday noon.

There were 35,000 in attendance at the opening session. The church is not on the decline if the gain shown by the Episcopalians during the past 100 years is maintained by other denominations, he said. From 30,000, or one in each 416 population in 1830, the membership has increased to 2,900,000, or one in each 60 population, in 1930.

Conditions through the east are far better than have been during the past few years, with such stores as Marshall Fields and John Wanamaker crowded on all floors and people buying high priced merchandise. From Chicago east everything was green in contrast to the area west. Around Minot, N. Dak., Swift found no sign of a living green thing, including weeds, during an extensive automobile trip.

Persons born east of the Alleghenies and who have lived there all their lives are highly parochial and exhibit a colossal ignorance as to the people and geography of the section west of the Rocky mountains, he said.

With a \$50,000 blanket road project for Marion county approved by the SERRA, County Engineer Swart today placed nine foremen with 61 men in various parts of the county with gangs of varying sizes under each, getting work under way on numerous small road projects, mostly clearing brush, ditching and similar jobs.

The biggest gang of 17 men was started at work on the new Molsan road under Peter Jensen. This new road about a mile east of the Pacific highway, will connect the Brooks and Jones roads.

Other foremen handed crews and allocated work as follows: M. J. Bettencourt, Independence section; Leonard Walker, West Stayton section; Theodore Fisher, Union Hill country; Jim Gully, Scotts Mills section; Joe Zuber, Sublimity section; W. W. Riggs, Stayton section; John Griesebauer, Mt. Angel section; John Kinsey, Silver Creek Falls country.

"The work today is just a start and various crews will be enhanced as more jobs are mapped out, and work started in the various parts of the county."

In addition to the above, work is going ahead with a good sized crew on the Jackson hill road. This is a separate SERRA project and does not come under the blanket appropriation. Work on this road started a week ago.

Under the blanket project the money is allocated to the project in a lump sum and it is up to the county engineer to designate the projects and spread out the work which is expected to cover the entire county and possibly give as many as 1000 men work before the winter is over. This will enhance the regular county road funds, a considerable portion of which have also gone to apply on relief road work.

His Holiness imparted a special benediction and said his audience "for so many different parts of America are very dear to our hearts."

SALEM PEOPLE HURT IN CRASH

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 13 (AP)—William Bowne, 27, and Mrs. Helen Newby, 29, both of Salem, were injured last night in an automobile collision on the Pacific highway near here but were expected to leave the hospital today for their homes.

Bowne suffered a fracture of the left knee, and Mrs. Newby received head injuries which physicians said were not serious.

Investigators said Bowne's automobile struck the rear end of a stage which had stopped, partly on the highway, to transfer passengers.

Bowne is employed by the state highway commission and Mrs. Newby by the industrial accident commission.

Gilbert M. Gibson of Bakersfield, Calif., and S. M. Mirantes, a Filipino, were injured last night when Gibson's automobile collided with a gasoline truck on the Pacific highway about 10 miles south of Salem. William R. Howard of Albany, driver of the truck, was not hurt. Gibson and Mirantes, the latter a hitch hiker who was riding with Gibson, received scalp and face wounds and both were taken to an Albany hospital. No arrests were made.
