They are Louise Van Alen Mdivani of Newport and New York and Baronne Eugene De Rothschild of Paris.

This year the dressmakers could not agree on the usual 10 best dressed women but expanded their list to 12. They estimated it cost each of the 12 an average of \$50,000 a year to maintain their paramount places.

The women selected, in order, are: 1—Mrs. Harrison Williams. 2—Princess Sixte De Bourbon Parmo. 3—The Hon. Mrs. Richard Norton. 4—Countess De Saab. 5—Begum Aga Khan. 6—Baronne Von Drieger. 7—Marquise Nicolette Visconti. 8—Louise Van Alen Mdivani. 9—Duchess of Alba. 10—Baronne Eugene De Rothschild. 11—Countess Antonin De Rottschild. 12—Princess Dora Ruspoli.

Not only wealth, charm and beauty were declared by the electing dressmakers to be essential to placing in the list, but vivacity, poise, personality, brains and "it".

Mrs. Williams brightens things about her with gay colors, scintillating jewels and luxurious furs. This year Mrs. Williams wears the new greens, stratosphere blue, black and white.

Louise Van Alen Mdivani is a delightful blonde of the charming wistful type. She likes pastel shades and ethereal fabrics rather than heavy stiff materials. Soft furs and discreet jewels further prove her claim to her ranking.
