

### WORK RELIEF PROGRAM WILL BRING BATTLE

Washington, Dec. 21 (AP)—Notice was given today by the United States conference of mayors that it would "bitterly fight any attempt to hold up work relief program at the coming session of congress."

This was among the reactions expressed to the series of recommendations made by big business leaders yesterday at White Sulphur Springs for aiding in economic recovery.

President Roosevelt was pictured by high authorities as ready to examine "on its merits" the program for recovery. A committee from the business leaders expects to confer with the president soon.

Meanwhile, Chairman Kennedy of the securities and exchange commission said it was too early yet to tell whether the 1933 securities act should be amended. That is for the future to disclose, he added.

The business leaders had advocated revision on the ground the act was retarding the flow of capital.

On relief, the business conference recommended:

"For those out of work employment on useful public construction projects not created primarily for the purpose of relief, and at wages not in excess of the direct relief payments which they would otherwise receive, would be encouraged in order that long-continued idleness, with its unfortunate effects, both physically and morally, may wherever possible be avoided."

"The mayor's statement said 'business now suggests we keep the unemployed in storage on a starvation basis until private business has the opportunity to exploit human resources again.'"

It was issued after a conference between Harry L. Hopkins, relief administrator, and a conference subcommittee including Mayor LaGuardia of New York.

"Every thoughtful student of the unemployment situation knows that what the unemployed want is work," the mayor said.

Human resources are too valuable to let decay under a system of pauperism, charity and idleness. "With over 10,000,000 people on relief in America's major cities, we shall continue our efforts to secure adoption by President Roosevelt of a sound financial plan which will give jobs instead of the dole to these citizens."

### Cranberry Ice Easy to Make

Cranberry ice is perfectly grand when served with turkey. We have found a most successful method which we are passing on to you. - CRANBERRY ICE**
- 4 cups berries
  - 2 cups water
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 1-3 cup lemon juice
  - 4 tablespoons orange juice
- Wash berries, add water and simmer until berries are very soft. Press through strainer. Add sugar; when blended, add fruit juices. Pour into ice cream freezer and freeze until stiff.

### Pound Cake Is Holiday Treat

Pound cake is one of the prime favorites in England during the Yuletide season. The secret of a good pound cake is in the baking and this department suggests that you bake the mixture for 1 hour in a moderately slow oven. Pour the mixture into a loaf pan lined with heavy paper or buttered brown paper. Our favorite pound cake method follows:

- POUND CAKE**
- 1 cup butter
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 6 egg yolks
  - 1 teaspoon almond extract
  - 1 tablespoon brand (optional)
  - 1 teaspoon mace
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 3/4 cups flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
  - 8 egg whites, beaten

Cream butter, add sugar and beat 2 minutes. Add yolks, flavorings, mace, salt, flour and baking powder. Mix well. Fold in egg whites, mix lightly and pour into pan.

### HANNA SIGNS WITH NEWSPAPER GUILD

Cleveland, O. Dec. 21 (AP)—Dan R. Hanna, Jr., president of the Cleveland News, Thursday signed a one-year contract with the Newspaper Guild. It regulates hours, working conditions and minimum wages for an editorial staff of 100, plus office boys and apprentices.

Reporters, editorial writers, rewrite men, copy-readers and photographers of four years or more experience are to be paid a minimum of \$40 per week. Employees receiving between \$40 and \$50 per week prior to Dec. 15 are given a 10 per cent increase. The contract sets a 40 hour work week of five days and provides three months pay in advance upon dismissal for employees who have been with the concern nine or more years.
