Oscar Hayer, city attorney, spoke on the negotiations being conducted at the present time with E. C. Kirkpatrick and Mill Grant relative to securing the necessary right of way for street or highway widening purposes. R. S. Kresson also spoke on the same subject.

A resolution advising the county court that the city would reimburse the county for moneys expended in acquiring the right of ways was approved.

A further resolution limiting the amount to \$500 was also approved.
