## WEATHER AND CROWD PERFECT FOR BOWL TILT

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1 (AP)—An eight year old argument was up for settlement today when Stanford and Alabama met in the 20th annual Rose Fiesta football game before 84,474 persons in the garland garbed bowl.

With all available tickets gone many days since, the largest crowd in the history of the classic was assured to see the struggle between the two universities that fought to a 7-7 tie here in 1927.

A perfect setting was promised for the struggle, with clear skies forecast and a slight wintry tang in the air. There was a fast turf under foot. There was little to choose between the two, although as late as yesterday a few had quoted Alabama on the heavy end. Scarcely any money was in sight, except at even figures.

With all the tickets sold, scalpers were expected to do a big business. As early as yesterday prices of as high as \$25 were being quoted on \$4.40 pasteboards between the 40-yard lines. The opening kickoff was scheduled for 2:15 p.m.

## COURT OFFICIALS REACH AGREEMENT

Seattle, Jan. 1 (AP)—A compromise was reached here yesterday by which the "strike" of northern division Pacific coast basketball officials was settled, at least so far as Seattle and eastern Washington is concerned. Carl Lodell of Oregon State college, president of the Graduate Managers' association, reached the agreement after a conference with Carl Kilgore, assistant graduate manager of Washington and Bobby Morris, Jimmy Mitchell and Perry Mitchell, Seattle hoop officials. The compromise will give the whistle tooters \$20 per game, \$5 a day for living expenses and \$7 a day for lost time from their regular jobs. The officials had demanded \$25, \$5 and \$7.

## HORTON SMITH PLACES FIRST IN GOLF PLAY

Long Beach, Calif., Jan. 1 (AP)—Horton Smith, 26-year-old professional of Oak Park, Ill., today held the California open golf championship with a card of 71-72-73-67 for a winning total 283, five strokes under par for the 72 hole struggle. In winning the title, Smith took \$500 first place money.

The victory of Smith, however, was almost secondary to a warm argument in which Walter Hagen, the veteran, engaged in with tournament officials. Hagen, as a result of being penalized two strokes on

the third hole of the final 18-hole round for picking up his ball from a tree basin and dropping it out a club's length, threatened never again to enter a California tournament.

Tournament officials ruled the ball should not have been touched. As a result of the strokes added to Hagen's score he was moved back from third place, with \$175 prize money, to seventh place, which gave him \$82.50.

Victor Rhenz, Deal, N. J., Pro, who shot a total of 284, took second place and \$300. Ray Mangrum, Los Angeles, was third with 285 for \$175 prize money.

Johnny Dawson, Chicago, was the highest scoring amateur, fourth place. He shot 287.
