GARDEN CLASS GIFT OF SERA

Rickey—Residents of Rickey and the surrounding community will be given an opportunity, beginning Monday night at 7:30 o'clock, to take a free course in landscape gardening in a SERA class to be conducted every Monday evening at the Rickey school house with Earl Litweller as instructor. Litweller was formerly landscape specialist at the Kansas State college.

The aim and purpose of the course is to provide practical landscape information for average home grounds by effective planning, choosing and identifying of the plant materials and cultural. The course will afford opportunity for discussions and questions and exchange of ideas and experience, and it is hoped that it will increase the appreciation of beauty in surroundings and greater enjoyment in life.

Some probable subjects for discussion in the class are planning the grounds, choosing the right trees and shrubs, lawns, shrubs and foundation plantings, planning the farmstead, water gardens and aquatic plants, herbaceous perennials, garden pests, rock gardens and Alpine plants, roses, native plants and wild flowers, and propagation, planting, pruning, cultivation and winter care.

It is planned to have the class make one or two field trips. The class is free and open to anyone over 16 years of age not enrolled in a high school or college.

Class members must provide their own pencils or pens and notebooks for note-taking. The instructor will furnish charts, pictures, lecture materials, plant material specimens, literature lists, and planting lists.

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Another Death In Freight Car Occurs, Albany

Albany, Ore.—John Mickstow, transient, was found dead yesterday in a box car at the Oregon Electric freight depot. Mickstow, who was found by another man in an adjoining car, was said to be about 35 years of age and a war veteran. It is said he was known to have been alive Thursday night. The county coroner is investigating the case.

This is the second transient to be found dead in an Oregon Electric freight car. The other man, not quite as old, was found dead in Salem a few weeks ago, an apparent suicide. His identity was not learned and he was finally buried by the Marion county authorities.
