Returns are required from any donor making a gift during the year exceeding \$1000 in value, to any one person. Recipients of gifts exceeding \$1000 in value also are required to file returns.

Members of the city engineer's office said today that if the rain continues the area in the southeast section of the city between 21st and 25th streets in the neighborhood of Lee street may experience another overflow of water late today or tonight. They reported the Willamette river has been rising steadily since noon Sunday.

Three forms of unemployment insurance which are nationally under consideration were discussed Monday noon at a meeting of local merchants and business men. Ralph Cooley, who was named conference chairman last week by Aaron Frank, Portland, northwest chairman of a similar conference, outlined the proposals. BREAK DISRUPTS POWER SERVICE

Local employees of the Portland General Electric company, augmented by a crew sent here from Portland, were conducting an investigation today and endeavoring to estimate damages caused early this morning when three high tension switches of the concern were blown out in this vicinity. Due to a prompt switch over of the load to the Mt. Angel high line, no interruption of electrical service was experienced except for a brief time at 4:40 a. m. the hour of the blow up.

Just what caused the disturbance, Wm. H. Hamilton, division manager, was unable to state. It is probable, however, something hit the high tension circuit on the west side causing an arc. Switches in the West Salem substation promptly blew out, resulting in a brief but brilliant display of pyrotechnics. A half barrel of oil was blown out of the switch at West Salem while the switch at the Salem substation lost a barrel of oil which caught fire. The blaze was subdued with little or no damage. The extent of the damage to the switches themselves however, cannot be determined until the balance of the oil is pumped out and the wiring examined.

Following the custom established by the late Thomas B. Kay, the Salem Y.M.C.A. through Douglas McKay, member of the board, is throwing open its facilities to state senators and representatives during the session of the Oregon legislature which starts next Monday. McKay, himself a member of the senate, sent letters today to each individual legislator, extending an invitation to use the Y whenever he had opportunity.

"Our building is new and modern, and includes two gymnasiums, two good four wall handball courts, fine tiled swimming pool and shower, an ultra-violet ray sanitarium, facilities for boxing, wrestling and special exercise and a comfortable lobby," McKay points out in his letter.

"Wednesday and Friday are ladies' days in the pool and if your wife accompanies you, we would be glad for her to use the pool and gymnasium for the ladies' classes. On Friday evening we have a social swim for men and women.

"The Y.M.C.A. is anxious to do its part in helping to make the legislators feel at home while in our city and we hope that you will accept this invitation and use it as free as your time will permit."

Projects have been approved for 359 teachers in adult classes and nursery schools in the emergency education program for the second term, which starts this week and ends March 22, C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, announced today.

Classes in "winter recreation" for both men and women have been placed on the teaching program in many counties during the winter term, Howard said. Classes which have proved popular thus far were said to be public speaking, English, Americanization, sewing, handicrafts, diesel engines, dramatics, economic problems and commercial law.

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SOLONS TO ACT ON PRESIDENT'S PROGRAM FIRST

President Roosevelt's program for state legislatures, as far as it affects Oregon, will be before the house of representatives here the first 24 hours of the session, John E. Cooter, who will be the next speaker of the house, said today.

The program, now in the hands of the governor, will be among the first items of business. Among the proposals will be an enabling act for bonding to carry on public works projects. Other enabling acts include provisions lifting statutory restrictions in order to operate with the federal government in its relief program. Cooter said.

This program will be followed by the Oregon administration program which is now in the process of preparation. Cooter has called an informal meeting of all house members, republicans and democrats alike, to meet at the Senator hotel Sunday afternoon for the purpose of getting acquainted. This session will precede the regular Sunday night caucus and no business will be discussed, the house leader declared.

DOTY CREEK TO BE RENAMED

Petition on part of residents in the neighborhood of Jefferson to change the name of Doty creek to Chehalup creek, the original Indian name, which has received the approval of County Judge Siegmund has been recommended to Washington by the Oregon geographic board. A copy of the letter making recommendation for the change to John J. Cameron, executive secretary of the division of geographic names at Washington, has been received by Judge Siegmund from Lewis A. McArthur, secretary of the Oregon board.

McArthur states in his letter that the petition is signed by owners of property through which the creek flows. The creek runs a little north of Jefferson and flows into a slough tributary to the Santiam river. McArthur states that the Looney family which joins in the petition is one of the oldest in Oregon and its members have accurate knowledge of the early nomenclature of the country.

The creek was named after Nelson R. Doty, an old resident of that vicinity.

PIONEER WOMAN TO BE BURIED HERE

Funeral services for Mrs. Eglantine DeHart Geer, 82, a pioneer of the Waldo Hills district, widow of L. B. Geer, who died at her residence in Goodhue Hills, Wash., Sunday, will be held from the W. T. Rigdon company chapel Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock with Rev. H. C. Stover officiating. Interment will be in Mt. Hope (Warren) cemetery.

Mrs. Geer was born in Illinois February 4, 1852, coming to Oregon seven years later. She lived in Silverton for several years, teaching school in that vicinity. Mrs. Geer is buried at Goodhue Hills following the death of her husband in 1909 where she acted as postmistress and later as employee of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway.

Survivors include five children, Mrs. Carrie Crozier, Union, Ore.; Myra Geer, Goodhue Hills, Bert Geer, Maryhill, Wash., Chet and Arch A. Geer, both of Salem. She was an aunt of Homer Davenport, cartoonist.

FATHER OF CARKIN CALLED BY DEATH

Eben W. L. Carkin, 84, father of John H. Carkin, state tax commissioner, died at the latter's home, 735 Stewart street late Sunday afternoon after a brief illness. He is also survived by his widow Ada Carkin of Salem, a daughter, Mrs. Theone Carkin Taylor and a son, Everett Carkin, both of Medford. Born in Appleton, Knox county,

Maine, July 10, 1850, Mr. Carkin married Ada L. York September 30, 1882. They moved to North Dakota in 1883 where the deceased filed on a government land claim and raised grain for 23 years. From North Dakota the Carkins moved to southern Oregon where they engaged in the raising of fruit. They came to Salem last April. The deceased had been in ill health for two years but did not become bedfast until two or three days ago.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of W. T. Rigdon company.

ARMORY SPORT NETS \$7695.33

During the six months of 1934 ending December 31, wrestling fans paid in a total of \$7695.33 to see the bouts conducted under the auspices of the American Legion, a report issued today by the boxing and wrestling commission of the city, states. The report was signed by Harry M. Levy, chairman, Dr. H. H. Olinger, Onas S. Olson, Watson Townsend and Dr. J. H. Lynch, members. Seven boxing cards conducted during the last four months of the year drew a "gate" of \$1388.50. Fines assessed against participants amounted to \$25, bringing the total receipts for the half year up to \$7695.33. The commission's share of 5 percent amounted to \$384.77.

During the year 1934, \$300 was turned over to the civic emergency fund to be used for charitable purposes by the commission, according to the report. The commission has a balance on hand of \$117.95 in cash and \$353 in city warrants, or total liquid assets of \$470.95.

Property costing \$711.02 is held by the commission, on which no depreciation has been written off. The expenditures listed include \$16.66 a month paid to Onas S. Olson as secretary of the commission.

BANK GETS HOUSING ACT AUTHORIZATION

Under authorization of January 4, the United States National bank has been approved as mortgagee under title 2 of the national housing act, in accordance with the provisions of this act. This is the first bank in Portland to receive such approval and covers the branch bank in Salem, stated D. W. Eyre, manager of the bank here.

This authorization grants the United States National bank the right to make and hold mortgages under the terms of section 2 of the national housing act. It was stated by Paul S. Dick, president of the bank, that under the direction of W. P. Choate, manager of the housing loan department, machinery has already been set up to afford the public such detailed information as desired.

"However," said Mr. Dick, "the acceptance of applications and the actual making of loans on mortgages is deferred until such time as all details of the system under the act are completed, and full regulations governing the making and handling of loans received. These final steps, it is believed, will be completed within a short time."

The terms of title 2 under the national housing act provide, in urban districts, for the refunding of old mortgages on home properties and for the construction of dwellings not to exceed a capacity of four families. Such mortgages will bear 5 to 5 1/2 percent interest, depending on the character of the mortgage, plus a small annual mortgage insurance premium, and in some instances a nominal service charge per annum by the bank.

Mortgage loans may be made with a maximum maturity of 20 years on which the borrower makes monthly payments and yet has the right of paying any additional part or in full at any time.

BIG MILEAGE MADE BY POLICE AUTOS

Five of the seven patrol cars of the Salem police department traveled a total of 148,817 on the paved streets of Salem during 1934, says an annual report of the department. No record of the distance traveled by the other two cars was kept.

The report shows that during the year a total of 970 arrests were made by the city police. These were for drunkenness 247, for felonies 105, drunk driving 26, traffic violations 451, juvenile arrests 54 and miscellaneous arrests 87.

Accidents reported during the year numbered 1385, burglaries reported 109, larcenies cases 289, holdups 2, automobiles reported stolen 123, and stolen automobiles recovered 122.

The police report, KQZR, made a total of 18,678 calls during the year and handled 5699 cases.

CONDON TO SAY HAUPTMANN IN LINDY NURSERY

(Copyright, 1935, by United Press) Flemington, N. J., Jan. 7 (UP)—When Dr. John F. (Dable) Condon appears as a voluntary witness against Bruno Richard Hauptmann, he will testify that Hauptmann told him he was in the Lindbergh nursery the night of the kidnapping, the United Press was informed on high official authority today.

Dr. Condon not only will identify Hauptmann as the mysterious "John" to whom he paid \$50,000 ransom in St. Raymond's cemetery, the Bronx, but will place him at the scene of the crime. This will be the state's second great stroke in its prosecution of the taciturn Bronx carpenter for the kidnapping and murder of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr. Col. Lindbergh identified Hauptmann's voice as that of the extortioner he heard call out to Dr. Condon at the cemetery.

These disclosures define the part Dr. Condon will play in the Hauptmann trial.

Dr. Condon probably will not be called as a witness until the latter part of this week.

Before Dr. Condon paid Lindbergh's money to the supposed kidnaper, he had one lengthy conference with him. "John" assured Dr. Condon that he was the man who climbed a ladder into the Lindbergh nursery and stole the baby. Dr. Condon will recite that conversation from the witness stand, and in identifying Hauptmann as "John" will thus place Hauptmann in the nursery.

When Dr. Condon asked "John" to identify two large pins he held in his hand, the extortioner is supposed to have said, "Yes, those are the pins that fastened down the blankets in the crib," and then to have gone on to describe minute details of the nursery from which the child was stolen.

IRA RIGGINS IS STILL SCRATCHING

Deer Park, Wash., Jan. 7 (P)—Ira Riggins still is scratching his head and other areas—over the ride he gave a hitch-hiker.

He picked up a young man who said he had an itch to get to Trail, B. C.
