

DISTRICT RELIGIOUS WORKERS GATHER AT TURNER

TURNER BIBLE MEETING CALLS VALLEY PEOPLE

Turner—Approximately 350 religious workers and representatives gathered Sunday at the Turner Christian church for the Santiam district Bible school convention, with the Turner Pentecostal assembly Bible school acting as hosts for the large delegation. The theme of the convention was "Holding Fast the Faithful Word." Convening at 10 o'clock, the morning session was devoted to opening song service followed by devotionals in charge of Rev. Ethel Gutzke of Salem, pastor of the Turner Pentecostal assembly. Bible classes were held in the large class rooms, with visiting Bible teachers assisting the Christian church teachers. After adjourning to the main part of the church, holy communion service with prayers by Rev. Jack Bailey, Rev. R. L. Morton and Rev. Judson Brown. While Raymond Titus, Louis Fowler, Fred Bates and J. A. Molt passed the communion trays, Rev. Morton gave an impressive worship message.

At the Bible classes 217 were in attendance, in comparison to the record of 42 a year ago the same day. A special number was presented by the Intermediate Bible class of the Turner Pentecostal church, under the direction of the teacher, Mrs. George Boyer, consisting of Bible questions and answers, a closing solo by Marvin Mickinham, James Boyer, Paul Rodgers, Edith Boyer, Clarence Greenlee, June Pardee, Mary Sheela, Fordon McCully and Edward Pardee, with Mrs. Boyer piano accompanist. At 11:15 Octav Voigt of Mehama gave an illustrative address on "Prophecy Being Fulfilled in Palestine," with congregational singing and dismissal prayer by Fred De Vries of Pratum, county president.

A good fellowship dinner was served at noon in the large basement dining room. The afternoon convention session opened with song service at 1:30 o'clock, with Aaron Olson of Salem, song leader; devotionals and worship message by Rev. N. Sherman Hawk, pastor of Turner Methodist Episcopal church; vocal duet, Elaine and Evelyn Clippell of the Lyons Bible school, with Miss Pauline Clippell, piano accompanist; reading, Vienna Taylor of the Turner Methodist Episcopal Bible school; vocal solo, Miss Lois Gates of the Stayton Baptist Bible school; special girls' quartet number, by Esther Voigt, Dorothy Teeters, Anna Purser and Marjorie Teeters of Mehama Bible school, accompanied by Mrs. Clinton Phillips.

Homers Leley of Salem, superintendent of Pratum Menomith Bible school, gave an illustrated address with colored pictures, followed by a special mixed quartet number by the Olson family of Salem, consisting of three brothers and small sister, with Mrs. Olson piano accompanist. The principal address of the convention was delivered by Rev. J. R. Turnbull, pastor of the First Baptist church of Albany, on the subject of "Why I Believe the Bible to be Word of God." The closing prayer was offered by Homer Leley of Salem.

At 3:45 o'clock the business meeting was held with Glenn E. McClellan of North Santiam, district president, presiding. Mrs. Nora Taylor of Stayton, secretary-treasurer, read the minutes and were approved. Fred De Vries of Pratum gave a short talk and announced special rates on Bible school literature. McClellan announced the next district convention would be held at Lyons, the first Sunday in April. Rev. George Pemberton of Turner Methodist church reported that a new plan originated by the local M.E. superintendent, Ivan Hadley, the past year for reading Bible chapters resulted in 12,000 chapters being read and recorded in the Bible school the closing year. The attendance banner was presented to Lyons Bible school with a 118 per cent average; with Mehama reporting the most Bible verses, and also having the largest per cent of attendance at the Turner convention. President McClellan thanked all those helping with the program as he was chairman of the arrangement program for Sunday's convention. In April, Harry Monroe, of Mehama, district vice president, will arrange the convention program at Lyons. In behalf of the Pentecostal assembly Bible school, Mrs. Alice Greenlee, superintendent, thanked the Turner Christian church for offering their spacious church for the convention.

POSTAL GAINS SHOW GROWTH

Independence—The Independence postal receipts have shown a steady growth during the year 1934, as shown by a report of the postmaster, Glen C. Smith. A final check reveals that \$9994 was the total sales volume for the year. This amount represents an increase over 1933 of 23.2 per cent.

The biggest gain of the year was in December, when receipts totalled \$1025.76, as against \$897.22 last year. Records of the office show the 1934 gain to have been consistent throughout the year. Because of the many new postal regulations, the effect of the high sales upon the rating of the post-office will not be known for some time. Under former rulings, with the two cent rate on first class mail, an aggregate of \$8000 was sufficient to permit a second class office. Based on the two cent rating on first class matter the Independence office did \$8140.08 in business. This is determined by taking 90 per cent of the volume.

SCIO COUNCIL GIVEN SUPPORT ON BOND DEBT

Scio—Prompt cash payments of annual financial obligations of the city of Scio for the year 1934 were reported by E. D. Myers, city treasurer, at the January regular meeting of the town council. It was further shown that sufficient funds are available to meet the bond of \$1,000 becoming due on March 1 this year.

The total indebtedness against the municipality on the date of the treasurer's report was stated as follows: Bonds outstanding, \$12,000; water warrants, \$1,500. The bonded obligation was incurred in connection with the light and power plant, which the city disposed of a number of years ago.

Amounts in various funds available January 1 this year were listed by the city treasurer as follows: Sinking fund for redemption of bonds, \$1,074; interest fund, \$476.84; redemption of water warrants, \$412; road fund, \$179.73; light and water fund, \$744.50; general fund \$358.22.

Condition of streets needing repairs were discussed and the matter was left to the judgment of the proper committee. Little can be done during falling weather, it was agreed, although Councilman Fred Roadarmel called attention that sand and gravel placed in pits on Mill street, leading to the school house from the east had served a good purpose.

Authorization to sell the city property on Pentland avenue adjoining that of Mrs. Jose Snirld, formerly owned by Fred Sturges, was made upon vote of the council. The price was fixed at \$200. It was stated that Mrs. Snirld had signified a desire to purchase the property.

O. B. Cyrus, city recorder, being called upon by Mayor W. A. Ewing for a report as to his investigation in connection with the petition of 54 city taxpayers, filed at the December meeting, for the appointment of a boxing commission, stated that the law requires at least 100 petitioning taxpayers. In which event a commission may be appointed by the mayor.

Roadarmel pointed out that "these taxpayers, including church people, did not sign this petition for fun," and that "he did not like the idea of no action being taken." He placed his position in the form of a motion, which was seconded by Councilman Fred Bryan.

"If it is up to the mayor, as seems to be the provision of the law, the matter is indefinitely postponed," Mayor Ewing interposed. The city council and the mayor should not presume to set aside a state law, and personally I do not intend to do it," the mayor added.

Bryan stated that towns as small as Scio had boxing commissions, and that "80 per cent of petitioning taxpayers of Scio should have consideration," to which Mayor Ewing retorted: "I object, and will not take the responsibility." The petition is indefinitely postponed, so far as I am concerned.

Upon request of Roadarmel, the names of the 57 petitioners were read by the recorder, whereupon Roadarmel renewed his request that the council take action in the matter. "The petition is illegal and contemplates setting aside a state law," Mayor Ewing reiterated, and the matter was dropped.

On motion of Councilman W. F. Gill, the reports of City Treasurer E. D. Myers and City Water Superintendent J. P. Oupor were accepted and placed on file. Record was made of canceled evidence of indebtedness and the papers were burned by a committee elected for the purpose. Superintendent Oupor's report showed the collection of \$1,267.02 during the calendar year 1934. The treasurer reported that, beginning with March 1 this year

LIBRARY GAINS FOR SILVERTON

Silverton—The annual report of the Silverton public library shows that at the close of 1934, there were 1467 borrowers registered at the library. The report also shows that there are now 18,998 volumes, which is 189 more than a year ago in spite of that 154 have been withdrawn from circulation during the year.

During 1934, 15,461 books and 1049 unbound magazines passed across the local circulation desk. The financial report of the library shows that receipts from city funds were \$360; from fines, \$17.08, and from rentals, \$117.08. Two hundred and fifty-five new books were added by purchase, costing \$168.59. A total of 22 books were rebound at a cost of \$16.11. For supplies, including postage, book pockets, date slips and so forth, \$8.27 was spent. A sum of \$25 a month was paid for library salaries.

Seven hundred and eighty reference questions were asked during the year.
