HAMMOND TALKS TO MENS GROUP

Woodburn—Rev. P. Malcolm Hammond, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, addressed the Men's club of Hubbard at an open meeting for men and women held at the band hall Thursday evening. Rev. Hammond took for his subject, "Must America Remain a Capitalist Nation?" In his talk Rev. Hammond defended the idea that capitalism is a system which cannot be reformed, and is made up of a series of inter-dependent elements of which no one can be removed without removing all; for instance, foreign competition and tariff, exploitation of national resources and business that is opposed to public welfare but reaps profits, such as munitions. These make up an illustrative list of three elements, no one of which can be removed without removing the essential element of capitalism, which is investment for profits rather than for service. He proposed consumers' cooperatives, and producers' cooperatives as a gradual escape from the present system.
