## OLDEST CREAMERY ASSOCIATION SAID

Albany—A 12 per cent increase in the volume of business done by the Albany Cooperative Creamery association was announced at the 40th annual business meeting and election of directors last week.

The Albany creamery is said to be the oldest in the state. During the year \$209,000 has been paid out to producers of cream, or an average of 22.8 cents per pound for butterfat. The association also bought 168,000 dozen eggs, 80,000 pounds of turkeys and more than two million pounds of butterfat.

## POSTAL GAINS FOR MONMOUTH TOLD BY GROVE

Monmouth—Postmaster Oscar Groves told the Monmouth chamber of commerce at its January night meeting in Monmouth hotel a story of the ups and downs of the postoffice receipts, presenting the following figures:

The changing point between third and second class is \$8,000, but a 10 per cent reduction is expected to be made now that the first class rate is three cents instead of two cents on letter mail. This would leave the local receipts about \$8,040, or still high enough to make the city a second class office, but this will be up to the postoffice department. If the change is made it will probably start July 1.

The change will mean two full-time clerks in the office. Groves also called attention to the fact that the evening mail leaves a little earlier than formerly and mail designed for it should be in the office at least by 5 o'clock.

President J. A. Churchill reported enrollment at the Normal school at the end of the week at 486, or 20 more than that of a year ago. He reviewed prospects for the new gymnasium, saying it has been approved and awaits release of the construction money in Washington. Friends of the school are interested in legislation for its benefit and he hoped for something definite from this session of the legislature.

It being the annual meeting, the chamber elected officers as follows: C. F. Gillette, president; Oscar Groves, vice president; L. B. Howard, secretary-treasurer; F. E. Chambers, retiring president, vacated the chair and Gillette took the gavel after a few appropriate words. Attention was called to the invitation of the Elkins Farmers' union to put on a program Friday night and all were urged to go who can. Mrs. B. Thornton of O.N.S. faculty will talk of her recent visit to China. Considerable discussion was included in over the prize drawing feature of the Good Will sales. It was decided to continue it or the next sale and then discontinue the drawing until further notice. In reporting for the annual finances, C. C. Powell reported that a total of \$70,000 sales was indicated from the distribution of good will money.

## Bank Stockholders Select Directors
