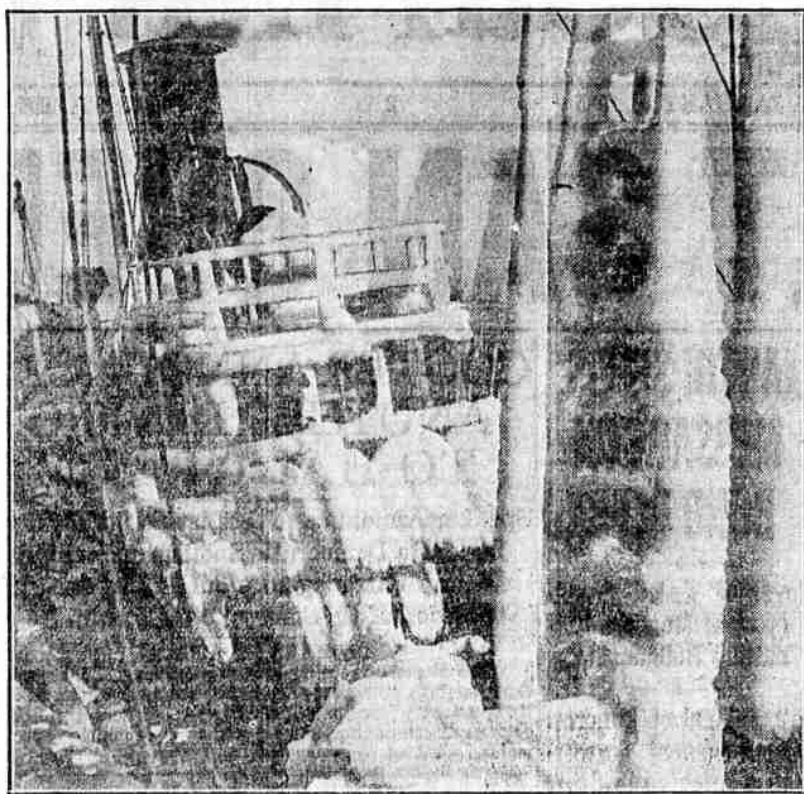
Silverton—Mrs. Ann Renick is reported to be very ill at her home. Mrs. Renick is past 80 years of age.

GROWERS PLAN FOR MARKETING CODE

Dallas—Loganberry growers of the Willamette valley are laying plans for a marketing code under the state act. County Agents H. L. Riches and J. R. Beck of Marion and Polk counties are cooperating with their loganberry growers in calling a meeting to consider such a marketing code. This meeting is to be held in Salem next Thursday, January 17 at 1:30 o'clock in the chamber of commerce rooms. All interested loganberry growers of the Willamette valley are invited.

A number of marketing codes have been developed under the state act enacted by the 1933 legislature and some of them have worked extra well in the opinion of many growers, notably, the prune code of 1934. The loganberry growers have had many discouraging things happen to the marketing of their fruit and it is hoped that this code will tend to overcome some of these bad features.

HOLY NAME MEN SEEK SUPPORT; PRAYERS SAID

Stanton—A large number of Holy Name men received holy communion in a body at St. Mary's church in Stanton. Their communion and prayers were offered for the oppressed Catholics of Mexico.

Another large group of Holy Name men assembled in special meeting in St. Mary's hall to discuss ways and means for an earnest support of the national crusade of the Holy Names society for the ending of the persecution of religion in Mexico.

In cooperation with the head of the National Holy Name society, and in participation of the thousand of Holy Name locals, the following resolutions were adopted and committed appointed:

"It was resolved to petition the government to withdraw its diplomatic recognition of the government of Mexico by recalling the ambassador, Daniels, and that the Stanton Holy Name society go on record, with all Holy Name locals throughout the land as protesting not against the enforcement of the constitution of Mexico but against said constitution itself."

"Moreover it was resolved to send our protest to the president of the United States and to the senator and congressmen from our district."

"Moreover it was resolved to call special meeting, and rallies if necessary, and to do everything possible to obtain for our oppressed brethren in Mexico the Godgiven right, freedom of religion."

LYNN SHEEP OWNERS RECEIVING PAYMENT

CHURCH FINDS MUCH WATER

West Salem—Several men worked nearly every day last week in an endeavor to locate the source of the large amount of water in the basement of Ford Memorial church.

A flood gate installed some years ago provides a method by means of which the high water in the river may be prevented from entering the basement and also provides a way of draining it.
