

TWELVE YEARS SERVICE ENDS FOR DR. FIELD

Otto W. Heider, attorney for the city for six years of Dr. Field's mayoralship, offered his praise of Mr. Field's service. Leland R. Sackett, clerk of the city, also spoke in the highest terms of the honored guest.

At the close of the program of speeches Mr. Einarhart of the Council area of Boy Scouts, of Portland, addressed the group upon the privilege Sheridan had of being in such an area and of serving the community in Scout work. His address was enthusiastically received.

Many guests were present, among the number Rev. W. C. Morrow, who offered thanks before the dinner was served.

BOARD ORDERS TUITION PAY

Albany, Or.—Members of the Albion county non-union high school board authorized payment of a total of \$17,975 to union high school districts and to the Albion high school first class district in partial payment for tuition of pupils living in school district that do not have high schools who are attending classes in high school districts.

The payment, which was authorized this week, was based upon current reports from high school districts as to totals of non-high school district pupils they are educating, and upon per capita cost reports of last year.

The fund was apportioned among high school districts as follows: Albany No. 5, with 152 pupils was given \$6,000 and Lebanon No. 16 with 294 pupils was allotted \$6,500.

Tangent No. 28, Brownsville No. 32, Mill City No. 129, Sweet Home No. 2, Plainview No. 3, Halcyon No. 6, Sheed No. 7, Corvallis No. 9, Eugene, Silverton, Jefferson, Stayton, 75A joint 77 each received small amounts.

The final payment will be made after the close of the present school year. This payment will be based upon new cost estimates by the union and first and second class high school districts.
