REACTING MINORITY IS FOUND IN HERDS

Albany—Only 39 reactors in the inspection of 584 dairy cattle in Linn county for Bang's disease was disclosed by an announcement by County Agent Floyd Mullen yesterday. Thirteen suspects were also found.

Reactors are being slaughtered at a local packing plant, where an average price of approximately 2 cents a pound is being paid. This is enabling farmers to get for their cattle nearly full value, Mullen said, for appraisals are being so regulated as to give cattle owners the greatest possible amount for his stock.

It was estimated that slaughtered grade cattle are bringing farmers from \$22 to \$40 per head. The return on registered stock is correspondingly higher.

PASTOR TAKES LEAGUE'S CALL FOR CRUSADES

During the recent drive made by the church forces of Yamhill county for a dry county in the last election Mr. Morrow was very active, and much of the intense interest in the temperance cause at that time is rightly attributed to him.

During his pastorate in Sheridan of a year and a half Mr. Morrow has greatly extended the work of the local church, and a large increase in membership has taken place. The church school has enlarged. Mr. Morrow is an interesting and spirited talker and draws a large audience. The congregation and community regret this severance with the church here but wish him the success they know he will have.

Mr. Morrow personally knows the head of the Anti Saloon League in Washington, D. C., as well as workers in Chicago.

Mrs. Morrow and son, Merritt, a senior in high school, will remain in Sheridan until commencement is over. The local pulpit will be filled by the Oregon conference at once and services will proceed as usual. Henry Funk will be chairman of affairs until the new pastor arrives. Leland R. Sackett has charge of finances.
