Consecration Services For Episcopal Mission Chapel Will Be Sunday

Monmouth—The new chapel of St. Hilda's Episcopal Mission at Monmouth is to be consecrated Sunday morning, January 27, at 10:30 o'clock by the Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins, D. D., bishop of the missionary district of Nevada.

This consecration was organized, and its first service held, by Dr. Jenkins, before he was made bishop and while he was vicar of McMinville and Hillsboro.

Upon the invitation of the Rt. Rev. Walter Taylor Sumner, Bishop of Oregon, Bishop Jenkins has been procured to officiate at this service, which marks the completion of his earlier dreams for the material equipment of this mission. The first service ever held by the Episcopal church in Polk county was on March 1, 1925, in the Odd Fellows hall. Bishop Jenkins' record says that there were "three townspeople, five members of school faculty (Oregon Normal school) and 20 students—28 in all."

Services were conducted in the Odd Fellows hall for several years, after which the congregation used the Luther House until the spring of 1934, when plans were put under way for the erection of their own chapel. During 1926 a sum of \$600 was raised, mostly locally, for the purchase of a lot. This lot and the chapel are located just west of Gray's Coffee shop, where the highway turns to the left and one goes south, beyond the Normal school buildings.

Some money was available from a fund previously raised by the diocese of Oregon. To this was added a generous contribution from the local congregation, and a gift of \$1,000 was secured from the "American Church Building Fund Commission" of the Episcopal church.

The building, planned by Lawrence, Holford and Allen, of Portland, and built by Cecil Price, of Monmouth, is of modern Gothic design and is constructed of hollow tile covered with stucco. It seats about 65 persons, including the choir, which is in the narthex at the rear.

The chairman of the building committee was Dr. L. E. Forbes, of the Oregon Normal school faculty.

During the past year this congregation has doubled its membership, and the group is most enthusiastic. Among its members are Dr. Churchill, president of the Normal school, and Mrs. Churchill, Dr. and Mrs. L. E. Forbes and family, Miss Bertha Brainard (registrant, O. N. S.), Miss Helen Anderson (dean of women), Mrs. A. E. Parker (preceptress of the dormitory), Miss Clara Trotter, Miss Gloria Parker, and Miss Taylor, all of the faculty of the Normal school, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Silver, of the Monmouth hotel, are also members, as well as several other people living in Monmouth, Dallas, and Independence. In addition there are many of the students.

The vicar is the Rev. D. Vincent Gray, rector of Good Samaritan church, Corvallis, who conducts services here every other Sunday.

The service of consecration is the act by which this building is set apart for purely religious purposes. According to the canon laws of the Episcopal church, the consecrator must be a bishop, and the consecration cannot take place until the building and property are entirely free of debt and all encumbrances. The bills were all met during the autumn, at the completion of the building, and services have been maintained in it from then until now.

In addition to the regular services, the vicar meets twice each month with a group of the students who have organized a Young People's Fellowship. The president of this group is Miss Hazel Ardell, of Portland.

RUSSIAN HABITS TOPIC FOR TALK

Monmouth—William H. Chamberlain, who for 12 years was correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor in Russia, addressed an audience in the Normal school auditorium Wednesday afternoon giving realistic pictures of Russian conditions.

Answering questions from the audience Mr. Chamberlain said that friends of Trotsky in Russia naturally would not make their preference known. They might meet in secret and organize in the same manner but it was at their peril for the government tolerates only one party, the one which it supports.

He said he thought the likelihood of the present regime being overthrown is remote. The only possibility that might lead to overthrow might be an unsuccessful war. Following the seizure of Manchuria by the Japanese, the Russians have shown greater interest in the preparation for war. On a visit to the factory region he noted the factory which turns out tractors was adapted to turning out war tanks also, and chemicals taken from the air for fertilizer, in another factory are also adapted to making explosives.

He thought that morals were being upheld in Russia, not as a matter of theology, but as something that makes their people more effective. Thus drinking liquor is opposed, not as a moral issue, but because it disqualifies the drinker for work; and the tendency is now to look askance at marriage changes for the same reason.
