

ANNUAL REPORT FOR WOODBURN LIBRARY GOOD

Woodburn—Mrs. Katherine W. Powell, librarian at the Woodburn Carnegie library, has submitted her annual report which gives many interesting facts, and shows the excellent use which is made of this splendid library by the community for many miles around.

The total list of borrowers is now 2953 and 158 were registered during the year. Eighty-seven volumes were borrowed from the state library for Woodburn patrons. 17,651 volumes of fiction were loaned; 1230 volumes of adult non-fiction and 273 juvenile non-fiction were loaned. These, with 1857 magazines loaned make a total of 25,752.

Two outstanding achievements of the year were the re-conditioning of 1600 books as a CWA project and the cleaning and renovating of the basement under the SERA which puts the entire building in excellent condition. The attendance in the reading room has been very satisfactory during the year.

Among the latest additions in fiction are "So Red the Rose," "Good Bye Mr. Chips," and "Lost Horizons." In non-fiction there are "A Challenge to Liberty," and "The White Headed Eagle," by Montgomery. The library is indebted to Mrs. Coble de Lospin for a copy of her first novel, "The Bells of Helms."

"The International Mind Afloat" is steadily growing and the books circulate well.

Dallas—Mohan V. Raj of Bombay, India, will present an address on India at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Mohan V. Raj is a graduate of the University of Minnesota. Born of Hindu parents he embraced Christianity. During the World War he served under the British flag in Egypt and Palestine with General Allenby. He has traveled among the people of all classes in India, is familiar with all religions, has had conferences with Mahatma Gandhi, has worked among the untouchables, has visited many mission fields and has an intimate knowledge of many little known phases of Indian life. He speaks no fewer than six Indian languages and English fluently.

The speaker, in his address, will talk on the agricultural methods used in India, the work of the missionaries, of India's struggle for independence, of Gandhi's influence, of the industrial, social and political needs of the country at large supplemented by a wide range of personal experiences. An exhibit of art goods and textiles will be arranged on the platform.

The program will begin promptly at 5 o'clock. This meeting will take the place of the regular evening service.

FARMER UNION OIL CONCERNS MAKING MONEY

Dallas—Cutting of a dividend motion and reports of a double business in 1934 over 1933 were high lights of the third annual meeting of the Farmers' Union Oil company of Polk county held in the Woodman hall at Dallas, R. O. Dodson and A. R. Mathys were reelected to the board of directors for a two-year period. All other members held over until next year.

The local oil company which has its headquarters at Derry Station has grown rapidly since its organization a little over two years ago. The report read by Secretary R. W. Hogg showed that the total sales for 1934 were more than double those made in 1933. Gasoline, oil, grease, tires and farm machinery comprise the list of goods handled by this organization. A total of 288, 277 gallons of gasoline alone were sold to the membership in 1934.

R. O. Dodson, president of the organization, reported that the profits for 1934 were greater than in 1933 because of the large volume of business. An eight percent dividend was declared on all common stock and paid at the time of the meeting Monday. In addition the company has paid several patronage dividends in accordance with the Oregon cooperative laws during the past year.

Their product is sold at the current market price and the savings or profits are returned to the members in the form of these patronage dividends.

The organization is open only to members of the Farmers' Union but under the amendment proposed at the recent meeting, the membership would be thrown open to any farmer who would purchase one share of common stock. This amendment will be presented at a later meeting.

WOODBURN PROJECT WORK WILL START

Woodburn—Work will begin Friday on 5000 hours of street work as an SERA project. The work will include cutting brush, digging out ditches and other necessary work about town. About 20 men will be given work and will be selected from those registered on the relief rolls.

Three men will be sent to Woodburn Thursday and Friday to register those who wish to work on relief projects and future workers will be taken from the new list.

Application has been made for \$85,000 worth of government financed improvements for Woodburn which would include street paving, a new incinerator, a new grade school building for the east side and a large drainage ditch. How much, if any, of this will be granted cannot be determined, at this time.
