ONS PRESENTS 4 NEW COURSES

Monmouth — Four new courses have been added to the curriculum of the Oregon Normal school this term. They are English literature I, recreation, I, pottery and community recreation.

English literature I, a three-hour subject, taught by Mrs. Beulah Thornton, is a survey of English literature from the Anglo-Saxon period to the close of the 18th century. This course will be followed by English literature II next term, which will complete the survey of English literature to the present time.

Physics II is the second term of a general course in physics, covering mechanics, sound, heat, light, electricity and an introduction to modern physics. Dr. Barrows teaches this four-hour subject.
