STUMBO GIVEN COUNCIL SEAT

LaDue reported purchase of 164 yards of gravel from the Salem Sand and Gravel company. He also reported that the committee on relief work had been a Dallas and found that the Hill street project had been approved. It will give work to 15 or more men.

A bill from the League of Oregon Cities for \$10 for dues of 1933 and of \$10 for legislative fees was read and ordered paid.

An application for police job was received from Charles Morris of Salem. It was read and referred to the police committee. A letter from the state planning board asking for the city's contemplated relief projects was read by the mayor. A motion prevailed that a copy of the desired information be sent to the federal government.

It was decided that the selection of foreman for any SERA job be referred to the relief committee. The year's financial report was given by Auditor Darby and accepted as read. It showed the city to be in a very good financial condition.

Samuel J. Young of Portland offered one of the city's 1921 bonds to the city at par. The matter was left in abeyance.

A committee from the Community club asked the city to gravel the street in front of Ford Memorial church. It was referred to the street superintendent.

An ordinance prohibiting the running of slot machines was given first and second readings. The third reading was postponed to give time for further consideration.

The city recorder recently granted of Miss Jennie Sigurdson, teacher of the fifth grade of West Salem school a permit to erect a house on Cascade Drive valued at \$1,000.

COUNTY UNIT PLAN MEETS OPPOSITION

Albany, Or.—Linn county's one-house "legislature" voted in opposition to the county unit plan being made compulsory at its weekly meeting Monday night in the circuit court room of the Linn county court house. The result was a recommendation 14 to 9, that the bill do not pass. However the majority against the bill is not as great as had been indicated at preliminary informal discussion, observers stated.

The governor's bill was thoroughly discussed and a vote was taken. Lively debate followed presentation of majority and minority reports of the educational committee. Ex-senator C. E. Williamson preceded over the meeting, which was attended by voters from all parts of the county.

Concerning a dairy barn in the neighborhood of Pine street which was ordered cleaned up by February 1, a number of neighbors appealed to the councilmen, previous to the regular called session, to abate the nuisance for good and all. Reports for the talk were officially given that the owners of the dairy had an extension of time in which to meet the demands of the neighbors.
