## SILVER AWARD OF GRANGE IS AT RICKREALL

Dallas—The Rickreall grange won the county agricultural trophy for the third year and became permanent possessors of the plaque. ## ORDINANCE FOR LIQUOR PASSED BY COUNCILMEN

Woodburn—At the meeting of the Woodburn city council Tuesday night an ordinance was passed relative to the control of alcoholic liquor.

The ordinance defines alcoholic liquor and among its numerous provisions, which conform to the state law, it provides that no liquor may be sold, given away, disposed of or delivered between the hours of 1 o'clock a.m. and 7 a.m.; that no drunkenness or disorderly conduct be permitted in a place of business where alcoholic liquor is sold; that no liquor may be sold that is not included in the license of the place of business; that the view of the interior of the place of business be unobstructed; that it is unlawful to drink on a public street, alley, park, school grounds or other public grounds in the city; that it is unlawful to keep, possess, sell, give away or otherwise dispose of or consume liquor in any public place or on any building used for public dancing; that the state health officer and city marshal or any police officer be authorized to examine the premises where liquor is sold to ascertain if the licensee is conforming to the ordinance of the city and the laws of the state and United States; that minors shall not be allowed to frequent, remain in or loiter where liquor is sold and drunk on the premises; and that no person under 21 years of age be permitted to serve or sell alcoholic liquor.

The penalty for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance is not to exceed \$50 or a sentence in the city jail not to exceed 30 days. The ordinance carries an emergency clause and becomes effective immediately.

On request of S. Y. Stubbs the recorder was instructed to write to the Southern Pacific company and protest against the practice of blocking the crossing at the Church of God camp ground and also other crossings in the city which are often blocked by freight trains for an unreasonable length of time.

A fence was ordered built along the line on East Cleveland street.

The bond of the city treasurer for \$5000 and that of the marshal for \$500 were approved.

A bill was presented from the League of Oregon Cities for \$20 for dues and an additional \$20 as an assessment for lobbying at the legislature. The recorder was instructed to pay the bill for dues but not the one for the lobby.
