Manufacture of the little red poppies which the American Legion auxiliary will distribute on Poppy day, May 25, will begin this month in many veterans' hospitals and workrooms throughout the country. Mrs. Maurice Taw, poppy chairman of Capital unit of the auxiliary has announced. The work will give an opportunity to earn money and beneficial occupation to hundreds of disabled World war veterans.

The poppy making will continue through the winter and spring months and more than ten million of the paper replicas of the famous Flanders Fields poppy are expected to be made before Poppy day. Employment is given only to veterans receiving little or no government compensation and men with dependent families are given preference. The number of poppies each worker is permitted to make per day is restricted to 300 or less to spread the employment among the largest possible number and to prevent the disabled men from overtaxing their strength. At the average rate of one cent per flower, the earnings of the disabled men will total approximately \$100,000.

On May 25, the Saturday before Memorial day, volunteer workers from the auxiliary will distribute the flowers on the streets of cities and towns throughout the country to be worn in memory of the war dead. Contributions received in exchange for the poppies will be used in the relief and welfare work of the American Legion and auxiliary.

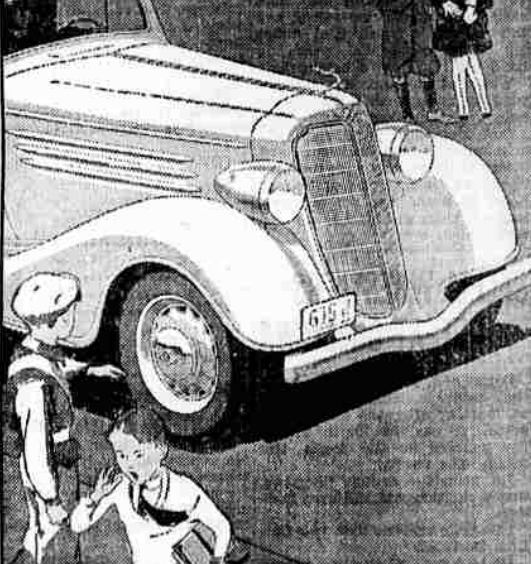
