County Courts to Put Relief And Pensions Up To the Governor

With practically every county in the state represented by either county judges or commissioners the group will move in a body on the governor this afternoon. They expect to lay on his doorstep the orphan

pension costs in their entirety and return to the counties 50 per cent of the Knox liquor law revenues to be used for relief purposes. And the motion further provided that any additional revenues for this purpose be raised not by property tax but by some sort of nuisance or luxury taxes.

Out of the hash of arguments and discussions advanced during the morning the following took on more or less concrete form.

That over a million dollars is budgeted for old age pensions over the state for the coming year and many counties fail to see how they are going to pay.

That if the counties could get their share of the Knox liquor law revenue back into the coffers they could meet the emergency.

That the amount now being paid for old age pensions is not doing the job and in many counties the law is being violated by the counties furnishing additional relief to persons drawing old age pensions.

That counties should get relief in one direction by the state relieving the compensation fees for SERA workers now being borne by the counties. Some of the smaller counties reported this a burden beyond their means with other emergency costs.

That every county in the state is in a serious predicament and is looking to the governor and legislature to help them out of their financial wilderness.

As a morning filled with argument was drawing to a close it was admitted that the session was getting nowhere and had formulated no concrete program.

A motion was offered that a committee be appointed to draft a program and report it back this afternoon to the judges and commissioners. It was stated the legislative committee already had a date with the governor for a meeting at 2:30 o'clock and after some amendments it was decided that all of the judges and commissioners wait on the governor in a body. A committee will be selected to do the main talking and the others will be on hand to answer any questions which may arise.

Multnomah county was shown to be in a serious situation, especially with the old age pension problem which is very heavy there and was conceded by the judges and commissioners to warrant special consideration in any move that it made. But the final plan of the state taking over the old age pensions and the counties getting back 50 percent of the Knox liquor revenues due them, seemed to be one that came nearest hitting all of the judges and commissioners on the right spot. This will probably be the one advanced to the governor as a basis for formulating a plan to meet the situation.

Earl Fruin, who has just completed six years of service in the navy, is visiting his mother at Salem and called on friends in Woodburn Tuesday. Earl is a graduate of Woodburn high school. For the past 18 months he has been on an army transport, sailing from the Orient to the Pacific coast and thence to the east coast.

Whereas, the above principles were broadcast to the voting public of the state of Oregon, and Whereas, the voters of the state of Oregon gave a vote of confidence by approving every measure of the election by a good majority, and Whereas, these stated and avowed principles, set forth by the Oregon Hop Growers, were for temperance, and to oppose the return of the saloon, and

Whereas, the Oregon Hop Growers have nothing in common with the hard liquor traffic and have much to gain by the promotion of temperance and proper distribution, sale and consumption of a light beer (a true temperance drink), and

Whereas, there is at the present time much effort being expended to all intent and purposes, to open up dispensaries or saloons for the sale of hard liquor by the glass, and

Whereas, much effort is being exerted by certain newspapers of Oregon to unreasonably blame beer for much of the drunkenness in our state today, and

Whereas, the tendency of state and municipal officials is to tax beer to a point where consumption is curtailed too drastically for the good of the hop industry.

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Oregon Hop Growers go on record as favoring the production and unrestricted sale of our temperance drink—a 3.2 percent beer in barrels and 3.6 percent beer in glass—and further go on record as favoring stricter regulation in the handling of beverages or liquors of a higher alcoholic content, thereby keeping faith with the people of Oregon and of the United States.

BUSH TELLS OF LIFE IN MALAY RUBBER FARMS

Rain drops which bounce three feet in height, jungles so dense the sun never penetrates, spiders the size of quarters which spin webs seven feet in diameter, were a few phases of a tale of adventure and experience which Willard Bush, a resident of Salem, but for some years manager of a rubber plantation of the Indo-Malaya country, related before the apell bound members of the Rotary club Wednesday noon at the Marion hotel.

In taking his listeners through the process of the establishment, cultivation and harvest of a rubber plantation Bush related incidents which would enable Ripley to continue his "Believe It Or Not" syndicate over a period of months.

The land to be planted to rubber trees is leased from the government for a period of 99 years at from 12 to 75 cents per acre per year, according to the stage of development.

The land, so densely covered with jungle growth that often an entire acre of trees will be cut before they finally fall when the key is used. Chinese laborers are used for this purpose.

The seedling trees which have been grown from seeds germinated in baskets are then set out 24 feet apart, coming into bearing about four and a half years later. Bush then went on to relate how the trees are tapped, the latex collected in small vessels and taken to the coagulating tanks and the drying and smoking sheds.

Wild animals of all types excepting the lion are to be found in the jungle which surrounds the plantation. The manager usually is the only white man in the district. The speaker described the routine which the manager went through daily, from arising at 4 o'clock in the morning, visiting the laborers quarters, on the look out for cholera and other dread diseases and the hunting of wild animals.

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Jones To Appoint Probation Officer City Police Court

As soon as a suitable person for the office can be located a city probation officer probably will be appointed, Police Judge A. Warren Jones said today. The city of Salem operates under a state law authorizing release of prisoners under suspended sentence, in the discretion of the court. This law also authorizes the appointment of a probation officer who serves without compensation.

The law authorizing suspended sentences and probation has been used by Judge Jones in lieu of actual imprisonment in first-offense drunk driving cases so far this year. He believes it affords a penalty equally severe with actual imprisonment and actually more restrictive, since the probation is for a much longer period than would be imprisonment.

It works like this: A man is arrested for driving while drunk. It is his first offense. He pleads guilty, or is found guilty at trial. Suppose the court gives him the minimum sentence of \$100 fine and 30 days in jail. In addition the court reports the conviction to the secretary of state and the offender's license to drive a car is revoked for a year. He pays the fine and loses his license. But the court elects to suspend the prison sentence and put the offender on probation say for six months. This means that if, within that time, he commits any infraction against the law, he has to go to jail for the 30 days as well as take the penalty for his new offense.

If there is a probation officer, as Jones proposes to appoint here, the law provides that the probation officer "when directed by the court, shall fully investigate and report to the court in writing on the circumstances of the offense, criminal record, social history and present condition and environment of the defendant; and, unless the court shall direct otherwise in individual cases, no defendant shall be placed on probation until the report of such investigation shall have been presented to and considered by the court. When desirable, and facilities exist therefor, such investigation shall include physical and mental examinations of such defendants."

The court is allowed by the law to determine and modify the conditions of probation and may include among them the following or any other:

That the probationer shall avoid injurious or vicious habits; shall avoid places or persons of disreputable or harmful character; shall report to the probation officer as directed by the court or probation officer; shall permit the probation officer to visit him at his place of abode or elsewhere; shall answer all reasonable inquiries on the part of the probation officer; shall work faithfully at suitable employment; shall remain within a specified place; shall pay his or her fine, if any, in one or several sums; shall make reparation or restitution to the aggrieved parties for the damage or loss caused by offense, in an amount to be determined by the court.

Once more hearing an objection to the final account on the estate of P. H. D'Arcy has been continued, this time to February 18.

Residential Finance Co., a corporation, appellant vs. Thomas Larkin, et al. Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit to determine whether mechanic's lien is superior to mortgage. Opinion by Chief Justice Campbell. Judge Hall S. Luuk, affirmed.

Clementina R. Cameron, vs. Edgemont Investment Co. a corp., appellant. Appeal from Multnomah county. Action for damages for breach of contract. Opinion by Justice Bean, Judge William A. Ekwall, affirmed.
