WOMEN PROTEST BALL MACHINES

Albany—Despite protests from two women's organizations, the Women's Association of the Presbyterian church and the Albany Parent-Teachers association, the city council Wednesday passed the game regulatory ordinance which was introduced and passed to the third reading at the last council meeting.

The protests lodged by the women's groups urged the council to refrain from legalizing "slot machines." The women also stated they believed that "games of skill or chance are of no benefit and are detrimental to the training of youth."

The licensing and regulatory provisions of the ordinance cover games of skill, consisting for the most part of marble or "pinball" games which were closed last winter by police acting under an existing anti-gambling ordinance. It was revealed by councilmen that marble games have been held elsewhere not to violate the state anti-gambling laws, and it was deemed advisable that a city law barring devices of this kind might be declared invalid. Those who place the marble games in their establishments will be required to pay an annual license fee of \$16.

DAIRY CATTLE FOUND SCARCE

Albany—Scarcity of dairy cattle because of disease eradication campaigns and drought effects will be far greater than most Willamette valley dairymen realize, it was stated at the Linn-Benton Jersey Cattle club meeting this week, by William L. Teutsch, Oregon State college dairy extension expert.

Teutsch told his listeners that prospects for the future market of registered and high grade dairy cattle are extremely bright, for herds in the middle west and east have been severely reduced by several influences of which the drought and anti-disease activities are most important.

Just as California has been getting much of its replacement cattle from Oregon, so will the east and middle west turn to this state, particularly the Willamette valley, for herd replacements, Teutsch said. The speaker advised Linn and Benton county dairymen should lose no time in building up high-producing, pure bred and disease free herds, that they may be ready to profit by the increased cattle demand when it arrives.

Plans were discussed by the dairymen for the 1935 spring Jersey show.

CARSON CALLS TOWNSEND ACT VISIONARY ONE

Albany—Joe Carson, mayor of Portland, urged preservation of governmental integrity by fulfilling promises to pay public obligations to keep property, and he assailed the Townsend old age pension plan as being "visionary," in an address before a large crowd of Kiwanis and Rotary club members and guests Thursday at a luncheon at the Hotel Albany.

Mayor Carson introduced his talk with an appeal for a unified state effort toward acquiring desirable settlers of whom he said Oregon is in dire need, and led to the declaration that the state and its governmental subdivisions must never repudiate their bonds.

"Those obligations were all contracted by a majority of the people," Mayor Carson said, "and the integrity of government is staked upon their payment."

In vigorously assailing the Townsend plan, Mayor Carson termed it visionary and ridiculous effort to delude old people into thinking that they can live in luxury and enjoy lives of ease without exertion or effort.

"The Townsend plan is merely an old fallacy presented in new form," the speaker declared. "Wealth cannot be made from nothing. The Townsend plan is no more feasible than perpetual motion."

Mayor Carson concluded his talk with another appeal for Oregon to use care in the increase of taxation and incurring of obligations, ending with the plea: "Let us be sure to keep the structure of our government intact that Oregon may no longer be the forgotten state."
