

MORSE SPEAKS UPON WEAKNESS OF LAWS TODAY

Monmouth—Dean Wayne L. Morse of the U. of O. law school addressed the East 'n' Talk club Tuesday noon on some of the weaknesses of criminal law procedure. He said while he agreed with the finding in the Hauptmann murder case, he thought the conduct of it was an indictment of the American people. Before attempts to reform court procedure in criminal cases is possible or can be effective there must be a readjustment of American habits of thought. Criminal cases cannot be tried in newspapers and on the radio, he asserted, and orderly procedure, minus the exhibition effects of a trial, are essential.

He told of the efforts of a committee appointed by Governor Meier to propose changes in judicial procedure and said that reform is a matter of long effort. One proposal is to arraign people charged with crime through district attorneys through information instead of by a grand jury indictment, and said that while information has been found to work well in a considerable number of states, the proposal to do without grand juries, was voted down in Oregon. A benefit of the change would be eliminated of delay in bringing a person charged with crime to trial. Now the accused is sometimes held without bail, waiting for the grand jury to act. Another proposal is to reduce the number of pre-trial challenges. The defense is now allowed 12 and the prosecution six. He thought the number should be cut down, saying challenges often deprive a jury of the more intelligent people. He asserted the law that a man is privileged to be tried by a jury of his peers is lost sight of through pre-trial challenges and the exemption from jury duty of members of many callings and professions.

He said he thought that if the defense planned to make insanity a plea, the fact should be stated so the state could avoid the expense of hunting up rebuttal testimony, in case it is not needed. Another proposal of the commission is to allow judges to make comment to the jurors on certain evidence. Oftentimes evidence is technical and difficult to grasp by a layman and the right of the judge to comment on the character of the evidence should not be denied.

Another reform proposal revolves around uniformity of sentence. Some judges, without thinking, are prone to levy the maximum sentence on certain crimes and on other crimes to levy the minimum sentence. Mr. Morse suggested this might be helped by creating an advisory committee.
