RELIEF WORK EXPLAINED TO ROTARY CLUB

How the various departments function, their aims and purposes and the problems encountered were outlined by members of the administration staff Marion county department of relief before members of the Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon. M. G. Gunderson of Silverton explained the manner in which the funds were secured from the federal government, the county and the state and praised the local organization highly for its record of keeping administrative costs down to \$1.56 per family as compared with better than \$2.70 in Multnomah county.

The six-point program of the relief department was discussed by Mrs. Helen Lamb, who said the portable cannery utilized by Marion county was a material aid in the reduction of relief costs. Other self help departments included the subsistence gardens, sewing, manufacture of mattresses and furniture and the cutting of wood.

She declared statements often heard that relief families were not of the communitarian type was not at all true; that while an occasional family is encountered which will not cooperate, as a rule those on relief form a cross section of the population. "The most hopeful thing about the whole sorry business is the fact that the unemployed have kept up their morale and when business conditions permit will be able to take their regular places in the community," she said.

Denser population of Multnomah county makes the task of administration relief there much more difficult, Miss Dorothy Gordon, recently transferred to the local office stated. In Marion county she finds most families eager to help themselves and are thankful for the assistance given them by the public. In Portland, the opposite is true, she said, many of them taking the attitude that the "government owes them a living."

The transient harvest worker and the man who has been forced to leave his home because of drought conditions were contrasted by Miss Brenda Savage, whose work brings her in contact with families from many states of the union. Many of those who have come west to start anew are being sent back to their home states because the Oregon department feels they will have much better chance to help themselves in their own communities.

BENTSON ENTERS NOT GUILTY PLEA

The biggest crowd that for years has gathered at Salem police court was on hand today when C. B. (Sonny) Bentson, beer dealer, was arraigned on disorderly conduct on complaint of R. E. Boatwright, member of the city council. Boatwright, who is an ex-boxer as well as a council member, carries a black eye resulting from an altercation with Bentson last Monday night. Bentson pleaded not guilty and the case was set for trial March 29 at 10 o'clock.

Believing, evidently, that the case was to be tried today, the large crowd, all men, had gathered in the court room and on the street outside when Bentson appeared at 10 o'clock. His attorney came in a few minutes later, the defendant was informed of his rights by Police Judge Jones, elected to plead not guilty and the trial date was fixed. The 50 or more spectators who had assembled were considerably disappointed when no testimony was to be heard.

Boatwright was not present, but was expected to be since trial was not scheduled for today. The council member was drinking beer in Bentson's place when the latter ordered him to leave. Boatwright is said to have refused to leave immediately, and the trouble followed. Bentson, according to the complaint, used his fists on the street and not inside his place of business.

Timberlands Bill Signed by Governor

The way was opened today for the federal government to acquire privately owned timberlands in the state to add to national forests. Governor Martin's signature was on SB 189 from which the house's amendment which would have required the federal government to pay taxes to the counties had been removed.

The governor also signed a bill cancelling the necessity for nine counties to repay loans obtained from the reconstruction finance corporation through the state. Some of the counties affected were Deschutes, \$20,168; Harney, \$2,000; Multnomah, \$725,000; Klamath, \$86,160; and Wasco, \$15,000.

JAIL ESCAPE BEING PROBED BY GRAND JURY

The Marion county grand jury today was in full swing on what promises to be a two or three day investigation of the jail break on the night of February 9 when Melvin Strand, trusty, and Patrick Gavin and Carl McKinney, prisoners, made their escape. Strand, who secured the keys to release the other two men was apprehended immediately and one of the prisoners was back that night and the other the next day.

The present investigation is result of instructions given by Judge McMahon to the grand jury earlier in the week. Only court attaches were present besides the grand jury and the court and the matter of these instructions has been kept quietly guarded since leaking out today. In the instructions, it is understood, the court intimated that he would not be averse to the jury going back into matters in which a former grand jury made a probe as to affairs of the sheriff's office under A. C. Burk, incumbent, including the matter of mileage on trips.

He also instructed the jury in effect to determine whether, or not too much liberty had been given in connection with the escapes. It has been hinted that the grand jury may investigate as to the angle of a statutory offense for too negligence in controlling prisoners and it is said an indictment could be returned under such a statute if proof was there to convince the grand jury.

Melvin Strand the trusty, was the first witness today before the grand jury of the 10 or 12 expected to appear. Strand's story to the grand jury, if the same as he has told outside, may have some sensational aspects as he has told officers that he secured rubbing alcohol from a drug store which he took to the prisoners and later went to the state liquor store, enlisted the services of someone standing on the outside who went in and bought some real alcohol, according to his story, which also went to the prisoners' party. Police are reported to have said that there were indications of intoxication when arrests were made.

All three of the men have pleaded guilty to informations in regard to their escape and the court has continued their sentences until further investigation, which is taken to mean the probe now being carried on by the county inquisitorial body. Following the escape Sheriff Bark announced that the trusty system at the jail would be entirely discontinued. In the receding investigation of the sheriff's office it was stated the matter of trusties also came up for consideration.

ARTS LEAGUE HEARS TALK BY ANTON PIERS

Although kings and princes and popes and cardinals all down through the centuries have tried to force art into specific channels, art refused to be captured and the individuality of the artists eventually won the battle, Anton Piers, Portland artist, declared Tuesday night to the members of the Salem Arts League at the March meeting held in the auditorium of the Salem public library.

Piers' talk drew a large and interested audience and his points were given close attention. A number of reproductions of famous paintings that illustrated specific periods, and several sketches of his own were used to point up his discussion. Piers started with an outline of art about the sixth century A. D. and by broad strokes brought it down to the present day. Art, Piers stated, has been dominated largely by the Italian influence. He finds it recurring at various times like a wave, yet it was, of itself, unable to hold its own. France, he cited, has been deemed an international center on account of many influences blending there. Wars and revolutions broke up movements and economic changes gave the artist more or less liberty to express himself.

Coming down to the present day, Piers said that a distinct and characteristic American art is developing. He commended the organizing of the Oregon Museum of Art and held that such treasure houses are necessary.

Perry Reigelman, president of the Arts League, presided at the brief business session that preceded the program.

house amendments to the truck regulation act. This afternoon they were prepared to report the bill back for final passage with three and a half pages of typewritten amendments affecting everything from the title to the emergency clause.

It will then be up to the house to take the revised measure or leave it—none of the senators seemingly being much concerned with what the house decides to do.

The house, meanwhile, will pass judgment on the revised power bill. It started originally as House Bill 404 (the Ickes bill), came out of the house utilities committee as Senate Bill 428, and emerged from the senate as Senate Bill 404. Of the proposal submitted by Secretary Harold Ickes there remains in the new bill but two or three clauses.

This morning the house committee on utilities, without so much as reading the senate bill, passed it with a favorable report. There are strong indications that attempts to amend at least two of its provisions will be made on the floor. One attempt will be directed at elimination of the proviso that power contracts cannot be made by the state power board for longer periods than five years, and the other will seek to impose restraint upon the power board in fixing rates for power. As the bill is now written the board may arbitrarily fix power rates at different levels in different sections.

House leaders assert that Governor Martin has indicated that unless these amendments are made he will be forced to veto the measure to protect development of the state.

The Washington legislature has definitely killed the Ickes power proposal and it is said that Governor Martin feels that it would be suicidal to impose power restrictions upon Oregon when it must compete

with its sister state for industrial development.

The tables of both houses are cluttered up with minor bills that may burst forth into fireworks at any moment. The senate has the anti-Piers proposal, designed to prevent Congressman Walter M. Pierce from serving as democratic national committeeman, and the house has the Erwin-Barnes resolution for an investigation of the state relief administration.

Governor Martin was busy throughout the noon hour with a hearing on the so-called milk bill, which would exempt cooperative associations from code provisions requiring pooling of surplus milk. The bill has been passed up to the governor by both houses.

BACH WORK TO CLOSE SEASON

Portland, Ore.—Positively ending Portland's 24th symphony season will be the presentation in the public auditorium next Tuesday night of Bach's superlative religious work, "The St. Matthew's Passion," which is being presented during the present Lenten season in commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the composer's birth. Tuesday falls exactly two days before the actual anniversary, which is being fittingly observed in all parts of the world.

The presentation of the "St. Matthew's Passion," comes coincidentally with a universal growth in popularity of Bach's music. Though Bach lived in the 17th and 18th centuries it has been said that he really composed music for the 20th century for his music is admittedly particularly pleasing to people of the present day.

Taking part next Tuesday night will be the entire Portland Symphony orchestra, the Portland Choral society, a special Lutheran choir, a large boys' choir, and the following outstanding professional vocal soloists: Helen McCartney, soprano; Iris M. Oakley, contralto; Virgil Day, tenor; and Mark Daniels and Merwin Dant, baritones.

Tuesday night will mark positively the last performance this season of the Symphony orchestra and its choral auxiliaries, and will be the final public appearance here until next fall of the distinguished leader, Willem van Hoogstraten.

BILL FOR REPEAL OF PARI-MUTUEL

A bill to repeal the state pari-mutuel racing act, thus eliminating all horse and dog races, was introduced in the senate today by Senator Isaac Staples of Portland. The measure was placed into the hopper by request and will be on the calendar tonight.

The bill, it was stated by sponsors, was a retaliatory measure as the result of the defeat yesterday of the slot-machine tax bill. The latter was defeated after the attorney general had ruled such a measure legalizing slot machines was unconstitutional as it consisted of a lottery.

MARTIN ASKS ERWIN MOVE BE SET ASIDE

Governor Martin today had called upon the house committee on resolutions to set aside a demand by Representative Warren Erwin and others for an investigation of the state's administration of relief.

Governor Martin yesterday promised a group of unemployed that an investigation would be made.

The governor said that "in view of the repeated assurances that I have given to members of the legislature that I intended to have a complete investigation made of the relief situation, I deem the resolution before your committee unnecessary and uncalled for and apparently made for the purpose of embarrassing the administration of relief in this state rather than assisting the governor and those in charge of relief in handling the difficult problems which always attend the administration of relief."

"I desire to re-affirm the statements which I made to representatives, a number of whom have proposed this resolution, to the effect that I have appointed four new members on the state relief committee in whom I have the greatest confidence, and that as soon as time will permit, after the adjournment of the legislature, I expect to call the first meeting of the newly-organized state relief committee, to be held in Salem."

"At that time I will make available to them all information and all complaints which have been given me with reference to the administration of relief in this state, and will ask the committee to make a thorough investigation of the methods of administering relief in this state, and of all complaints that have been filed, or that may be filed, and will ask the relief committee to make a complete report of their findings to me."
