GRADE SYSTEM CHANGES MADE AT SILVERTON

Silverton—With the foremost editorial writers of the state beginning to comment on the "S" or "U" system of grading reports of pupils for the parents' consideration, the fact that the Silverton schools are now using that system may be of interest. Not a book subject is mentioned, such as arithmetic, reading, etc., on the report card that goes home to the parents. "S" or "U" tells only of subject matter, use of leisure time, ability to work alone, ability to cooperate in group activities, and ability to play with others. There are records of tardiness and absence and under health records are cleanliness, health habits, posture, cheerfulness and gait or loss in weight.

The teachers in the Silverton schools keep a complete desk record of each pupil's progress in all subjects studied, such as were wont to be on the report cards sent home. The Silverton school system is considered among the first in the state and the change would not have been gone into without much pre-consideration. The main idea is a matter of training in attitudes.

Robert Goetz, superintendent of the schools, sent explanations to each parent at the instigation of the change in marking.

Kramer is listed for 9:30 Saturday forenoon on the subject "Organization of Guidance Service," led by Dean Grayson N. Kefauver of Stanford educational department.

This is a conference on guidance in education at the University of Oregon April 12 and 13. The session is held in conjunction with the state band contest for secondary schools under the auspices of Chi chapter of Phi Delta Kappa and the school of education of the University of Oregon. The guests are administrative leaders and teachers of the state.
