SLAYER OF GOATS DROPPED BY RIFLE

Dallas—Arthur Arrance, a world war veteran living in Socialia, valley about four miles northwest of Dallas City, scored a direct hit on a big cougar, when the cat ventured too close to his goat corral.

Arrance, accompanied by his wife, who was the accessory after the fact, appeared at the office of the county clerk to claim his bounty Friday afternoon. He related the following:

His goats were being killed night after night and no later than Tuesday night three of the herd were excoated as tribute by the cougar. He appeared again Wednesday night and when asked was only 40 feet from the kitchen door. Thursday two goats were killed up outside the corral and Arrance, with his rifle and his wife, with a flashlight, took up their positions when it became dark.

As soon as one of the goats bled, on went the flashlight revealing the raider. Arrance fired quickly, the shot striking the cougar in the right nostril. He made three jumps towards Arrance and then tumbled over.

His tip to tip measurement was seven feet.
