

DUCKS VICTIMS ANGELS SIXTH INNING RALLY

(By the Associated Press)
Los Angeles Angels maintained their lily-white record in the Pacific Coast league baseball race today, perched on top of the scramble after turning in their fifth victory in as many starts.

The victims yesterday were the Portland Ducks, who lost a 9-5 verdict as Jack Lelivelt's crew turned on the steam in the fifth inning to score six runs after trailing 3 to 1. A double, four singles, three walks and a sacrifice did the damage.

Taking advantage of defeats handed Hollywood and the Missions, Seattle slipped into third place by slapping San Francisco around Seals stadium in an 11-5 night game. The teams were tied for the cellar position before they started, but the Indians jumped on Stutz and Sheehan for 16 hits.

Oakland's victory over Hollywood, 2 to 1, which kept the mittmen in second place, and Sacramento's 4-2 win over the Missions enabled Seattle to move up from the bottom. The Oaks had to wait until the eighth inning before solving the deliveries of Archie Campbell for the game's only score. Bill Ludolph held the Stars to four hits and struck out seven.

Sacramento got back on the band wagon when Tom Flynn's mound work held Gabby Street's Reds to six scattered hits. The Senators stacked up three runs in the second frame when Berres, doubled to clear the base.

Karch, who gave away two pounds at 160, had an unmistakable edge throughout. It was a scheduled six rounder.

In a fierce six rounder Les Bain, 135, Tacoma, outslugged Eddie Spina, 131, Portland, for a six-round decision. Dick Johnson, 155, Portland, knocked out Cecil Jordan, 151, Seattle, in the third of a scheduled six rounder.

Corvallis, Ore., April 13 (AP)—Oregon State baseball team opened its season Friday by walloping Linfield 10 to 3, scoring in every inning but the second. Earl Conkling, Beaver first sacker, had five hits including a homer and a two bagger, in five times up. The Beavers got 21 hits. Each team made three errors.

Cincinnati (AP)—Only one in five Cincinnatians would be willing to volunteer or have their kin volunteer for an American war on foreign soil, but three out of four would go to war and expect others to go, in case of invasion, answers to a war-and-peace questionnaire circulated by a local newspaper showed.

Twenty-three men's and women's luncheon and civic clubs, four high schools, a college class and a typical group on relief constituted the cross-section by the survey. Seventy-five percent voted for nationalization of the arms industry to take profits out of war.

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LOUIS, NEGRO BOXER, STOPS LAZER IN 3RD

Chicago, April 13 (AP)—Roy Lazer of Paterson, N. J., who had pieced together a string of 35 straight victories, today was just number eighteen on the list of heavyweights who tried to lick Detroit's sensational Joe Louis, and didn't even come close.

The calm, cunning negro, who is mentioned every time there is talk of a contender for a world championship battle with Max Baer, spent not quite three rounds in battering Lazer out of action last night in the Chicago stadium. The triumph, Louis' eighteenth straight as a professional, goes into the book as a technical knockout. Lazer's seconds having ended the bout by tossing a towel into the ring at the count of six on their warrior's third trip to the floor. The timekeeper, however, could have counted indefinitely.

Louis, as usual, fought carefully in the first round, began to catch up in the second, and wasted no time in the third. He had the range and twice floored the Jersey batter with left hooks for counts of nine. He backed Lazer against the ropes, knocked him sagging with another punch of lefts, then finished him off with a crashing right to the chin. The round lasted 2 minutes and 28 seconds.

The outcome amazed not one of the boom-sized crowd of 17,826 spectators, including the champion, Baer himself.

The gate last night, \$42,187.80, made the promotional venture of Nate Lewis and Jim Mullen a financial as well as artistic success.

STUPIDITY MAY RULE AMERICA

Houston, Tex. (AP)—A battle between the stupid and the intelligent is raging for inheritance of America, Dr. Albert Edward Wiggam, scientist and author, believes.

"The outlook for stupidity," he asserted, "is very encouraging, I think." The federal government, the author-scientist said, is buying incompetent children by providing relief for millions without disseminating adequate birth control information.

Intelligent people are dying out. Unskilled classes are reproducing rapidly. He said this condition was rendered more serious by giving relief to the 25,000,000 on federal and state rolls.

Solution lies in birth control. "The American Eugenics society," he said, "is trying to induce the governors of the states where there are birth control clinics to advise each family going on the relief rolls to consult with clinical specialists for advice on family regulation."

These people, particularly the women, are eager to regulate the size of their families, Dr. Wiggam believes.

His reason for believing the stupid will rule America was that they will far outnumber the intelligent, thus be able to control elections.

The game, which consisted of four 10 minute periods was a hard driving contest and neither side had little mercy on the other.

The "regulars" with Hoffer, Glatfelter, Cottew and Elliott in the back field held the advantage during the first half and only the timer's whistle kept them from scoring a touchdown. With a few seconds remaining in the second period Sol Malzel intercepted a pass on his own 30 and picked up the interference in a nice manner reached the one yard line before being tackled by Coons.
