HOEPEL PLANS FEDERAL TAX ON ALL MACHINES

Washington, April 13 (AP)—The "technotax"—a new levy on machinery according to the number of workers it displaces—was proposed in the house today by Representative John H. Hoeppel, (D. Cal.). In advocating this "technotax," Hoeppel blamed the economic plight of the nation on the increasing use of machinery with consequent overproduction and unemployment.

He said he had not studied the idea deeply yet, but pointed out that he introduced a resolution recently calling for creation of a commission which would be directed to survey potentialities of the plan.

The Townsend plan was advanced during general debate on the administration's social security measure. Most speeches centered around the Townsend old age pension plan.

The Townsend plan was defended by Hoeppel and Representative Thomas, (D. Cal.), while Representative Stephen M. Young of Ohio and Frank H. Buck, California, democrats, opposed it.

Hoeppel declined to discuss the "Technotax" on the grounds that he did not know enough about it. "But the idea occurred to me," he said, "and it sounds attractive enough to make me believe it may be the new ace which will show the new deal how to lead the nation out of the depression."

"That's why I introduced my resolution calling for a commission to study and investigate the possibilities of the idea," Ford criticized the administration's pension proposals, saying "federal contribution is too low and the age limit too high."

Hoeppel and Ford joined in telling the house the Townsend plan or some proposal giving aged persons equally large benefits not only would lift the United States from the depression but would be "justice" to thousands of elderly citizens.

San Rafael, Calif., April 13 (AP)—Two San Quentin prison convicts, Alexander Mackay and Joe Kristy, were sentenced to death here today for their part in the sensational escape attempt of last January 16.

Notice of appeal was immediately filed by attorneys for the two convicts, who said they plan to ask a strict interpretation from the California supreme court of the kidnapping-robbery law under which the men were convicted.

Superior Judge Edward J. Butler set June 21 as the date for execution, but it was expected the double hanging would be automatically delayed by the appeal.

St. Louis, Mo., April 13 (AP)—Harry Cain, 55, negro, was shot and killed today in the Black and Tan beer parlor because he was a "kibitzer."

Police held for questioning Rye Tolder, 46, another negro. Police charged that Tolder, enraged because Cain persisted in giving him advice in a five cent dice game, shot Cain through the heart.

COURT REDUCES HAULING CHARGE

The county court today announced a new price for gravel hauling effective the first of the month of 8 cents a yard mile to replace the 10 cents a yard mile which has been effective since the NRA got into play. Formerly the court paid 7 cents a yard mile for gravel hauls but analysis of the figures indicated the haulers were only breaking even and the rate was increased to 8 cents. When the NRA became effective and there was a general boost of wages and reduction in hours the court voluntarily placed the price at 10 cents per yard mile.

Later some of the gravel haulers have made offers to haul for 8 cents and the court decided to make this reduction on basis of these offers. Hauling will be divided among Marion county men as equitably as possible to pass it around.

Gravel hauling is expected to be a very material item in road expenses this year because of the necessity for use of large amounts of rock under the oiling program as well as for stock piles and the regular gravel hauling necessary.

CALL MONEY HITS RECORD LOW LEVEL

New York, April 13 (AP)—The decision of several large Wall Street bankers to cut the charge for "outside" call money to 1/4 of 1 per cent next week brought the cost of money for the purchase of stocks on margin to the cheapest rate on record.

Wall Street wondered whether the action of the banks in cutting the rate on "outside" money would result in a cut in the official rate for call funds at the loan desk in the stock exchange. Official call money was hung on the 1 per cent peg since December 7, 1933. Previous to that it had ruled at 1/4 of 1 per cent. The only other time call money was quoted at 1/4 of 1 per cent at the loan desk was in August, 1928.

BIDDING SYSTEM WINNER FOR ELY

New York, April 13 (AP)—Ely Culbertson credited his self-styled "papa" "mama" bidding system today for a 16,130 point victory over P. Hal Sims in their 150 rubber contract bridge match.

The marathon contest ended in handshaking and congratulations that belied its advance billing as a grudge battle. One of the main issues in the match was which system was more efficacious for husband and wife partnerships. Just what else was at stake neither of the principals would disclose.

Twenty-seven sessions were held with the match starting on March 25. Mrs. Sims and Mrs. Culbertson missed only one afternoon of play. That day Culbertson lost about \$750 to Sims at 25 cents a point. During the match the Culbertsons lost considerable money from being late. They forfeited \$25 for each tardy appearance.

The rubber count showed 82 won by the Culbertsons and 68 by their rivals. The losers held the greater number of aces, kings and queens. Sims played the most hands. Culbertson next and Mrs. Sims was dummy more often than any other player.

Gangster Shot Down On Chicago Street

Chicago, April 13 (AP)—Sanford (Gimp) Rosenbaum, 34, former bodyguard for Edward (Spike) O'Donnell, was shot three times today in a daring gangland attack in the heart of the loop.

Rosenbaum, who stubbornly refused to name his lone assailant, was taken to Cook county hospital with wounds in the mouth, left shoulder and right arm. Physicians said he would live.

Jury Acquits Elk Killer At Seaside

Astoria, April 13 (AP)—An acquittal was ordered in justice court here today for Jasper Hovgaard, Seaside rancher, who killed 20 elk which invaded his property, he said, damaged his crops and frightened his livestock. The elk were killed over a period of several months.

Hovgaard admitted killing the big animals but declared he had pleaded for years with the state game commission for protection against the hungry herds and had received no aid. The justice court jury deliberated but 10 minutes.

COUNTY HEALTH UNITS ENDORSED

Pendleton, April 13 (AP)—Full time county health units and making the public health conscious were the major points discussed by the Oregon Tuberculosis association in the closing day of the annual session here with other 100 delegates registered.

The need for more health nurses over the state was stressed by officials who described conditions in their various counties. Dr. C. I. Drummond, Jackson county, and Dr. James Campbell, Douglas county, discussed the success of health organizations in their sections.

At a luncheon meeting this afternoon, the final session, Mrs. Sadie Orr Dumbear, executive secretary of the Oregon group, spoke on important health legislation.

CRESCENT CITY MAY GET COLONY

Washington, April 13 (AP)—A colonization and development plan for Crescent City, Cal., to cost about \$10,000,000, and offering a fair haven to the refugees from the parched drought area of the northwest, has been suggested to the federal relief administration.

The program would include completion of the Oregon-California railway between Grants Pass, Ore., and Crescent City, and development of the natural harbor in the latter city.

Establishment of some kind of a federal authority similar to that now developing the Tennessee valley was suggested for the control of the railroad, the harbor and the administration of the colonization work.

The plan was laid before the relief administration Friday by Richard D. Daniels, Washington, D. C., attorney who is representing the Redwood Empire. Daniels said he presented the matter to Col. Lawrence Westbrook, head of the rural rehabilitation program, rather than to the public works administration, because it appeared to fit in better with relief plans.

Under the relief, families from the drought areas or from submarginal land could find new homes in great numbers in the fertile, clement valley the development would open.

ONE-MAN STRIKE KEEPS SHIP IDLE

Longview, Wn., April 13 (AP)—The steamer Hanley of the Weyerhaeuser line lay idle at the timber company's docks again today while Bruce Hensley of Seattle, radio operator, continued his successful one-man strike to prevent the ship from completing its cargo.

Hensley took up his picket post outside the mill gate yesterday morning with a sign declaring the Hanley unfair and announcing he was on strike. Fifty longshoremen who have been loading the vessel since it docked Monday refused to cross the picket line.

The lone striker denied his was really a one-man strike. He declared that all other operators on the Weyerhaeuser line are to do likewise when their ships dock to gain increase in their monthly salary. They claim a raise was promised them.

CROP CONTROL LAW TAX FEATURE VOID

Louisville, Ky., April 13 (AP)—Tax collecting provisions of the Kerr-Smith tobacco crop control law were held unconstitutional here today by Federal Judge Charles J. Dawson, who ruled that the internal revenue collector cannot collect an assessment from Penn brothers, Fayette county tobacco dealers.

Judge Dawson issued an order restraining the district attorney from enforcing the act, which he said "is designed solely to regulate and control and not as a tax collecting medium."

Twenty-five per cent (\$7059) of the Penn brothers' receipts from their 1934 crop have been impounded pending a ruling in the case. These were ordered released by Judge Dawson.

Iowa Judge Chosen Walton League Head

Chicago, April 13 (AP)—Judge George W. Wood, of the Waterloo juvenile court, was elected president of the Isaac Walton league of America today at the final meeting of the league's thirteenth annual convention.

NO HARD TIMES ON TUNUNAK ISLAND

Anchorage, Alaska, April 13 (AP)—Having flown 500 miles from Tununak, A. M. Springer, virtual but unceremonious "king" of Nelson Island, was here today telling of the one spot and the one industry that knows no depression.

He said his "subjects," the 500 Eskimo residents of the barren mountainous island, are unable to keep up with the demand for their hand-woven baskets.

Time was, said Springer, government agent, school teacher and manager of the cooperative store through which the basket makers market their wares, when Nelson island was world famed for its native, hand-carved walrus ivory ornaments. But this was lost favor among souvenir and curio buyers and the Nelson islanders fell back on their equally ancient basketry art.

Foxes, flourish and so do the hundreds of reindeer introduced on the island two years ago as a food and reindeer supply.

Other than Springer and his wife, the only white on Nelson island is Father Deacon, a priest carrying on the mission work initiated at Tununak, Cape Vancouver, by Father Barnum in 1891.

HIGHWAY WORKER CRITICALLY HURT

Bend, April 13 (AP)—Carl Swanson, highway construction worker, was critically injured Friday by a premature explosion of a charge of dynamite. His face, arms and chest were peppered with rock fragments. The accident occurred on the Warm Springs cut-off on the Vionora grade west of Madras. Swanson was brought to a hospital here.
