

FUNDS EXIST FOR PEAR AND APPLE LOANS

Washington, April 13 (AP)—Senator Stetson (R-Ore.), said today that more than \$22,400,000 remains in the emergency crop and feed loan from which funds for emergency loans to Oregon and Washington apple and pear growers may be obtained.

This money, the senator said, was a part of the \$525,000,000 allocation by the president, of which \$96,785,000 was given to the farm credit administration for emergency crop loans. Of this \$96,785,000 the president requested that \$10,000,000 be held in reserve and not expended unless directed by the White House, the senator said, while expenditures up to April 8 were \$43,358,000, leaving an actual balance on that date of \$22,416,915.

Senator McNary (R-Ore.), said the emergency loans for dormant spray and other early orchard activities were not needed in Oregon, but added the supplemental loans needed in Washington orchards would come from this fund.

This is the same program on which the Washington State congressional delegation and E. A. Carroll and H. A. Ingraham, representative orchardists of the Wenatchee valley have been working for several weeks.

Last week these men were assured by farm credit officials that funds would be made available for the early orchard work through loans which would be made secondary to the regular production credit corporation loans which have first lien on the crop.

At that time it was understood these supplemental loans would be limited to \$500 per individual or \$400 an acre. Information received in Senator Stetson's office, however, indicated that in view of the announced intention of PCA officials to declare the Wenatchee valley a stricken area the administration would be at liberty to make larger loans where needed. The law provides that where an area is stricken the amount of any loans is left to the discretion of the administrator.

Following announcement last week that supplemental loans would be made available to Washington state orchardists from the emergency fund, Carroll and Ingraham conferred with the Oregon senators on the fruit situation as a whole in the two states.

SEALERS FAST IN NORTH ICE PACK

Tromsø, Norway, April 13 (AP)—A northerly gale raged today in the region where 160 seal hunters are aboard 15 ships frozen fast in the packed ice since March 26.

First reports said only seven ships were trapped in the area near Jan Mayen island, east of Greenland, but a later checkup disclosed eight more of the Norwegian sealing craft were held fast.

The exact position was undetermined.

The Janmayen wireless reported severe weather, leading to the belief here that the situation of the trapped men was most serious.

Sealers who returned to this port said the fleet last was sighted March 26.

Elling Aarseth, president of the Seal Hunters' association, expressed the opinion that if a rescue expedition fails to reach the marooned ships, the only hope of the men is for the ships to follow the ice drift south toward Denmark strait, this could be accomplished next month.

Use of Water Asked For Oregon Industry

Two applications for sizeable water appropriations were filed in the office of Charles E. Strickland, state engineer, last week.

A. R. McGuire, Galice, Ore., filed for a permit to appropriate 125 second feet of water from Left Fork Galice creek, Clatskanie, Bartley, Sallor, Jack, China Gulches, and unnamed creeks for mining, sawmill and reduction work in Josephine county.

E. T. Shayton, Prineville, wished to appropriate 100 second feet of water from Johnson creek, tributary of Crooked river, for irrigation of 60 acres and for domestic and stock purposes in Crook county.

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UTILITIES AND MINES LEAD IN MARKET'S RISE

New York, April 13 (AP)—Utilities shared leadership of another stock market rise today with the mining shares, which continued to advance on the rise in silver prices.

Trading was active for a Saturday. Consolidated Gas was the most actively traded issue, crossing 22. Cerrito de Pasco was next. It made a new high since 1930 at 51 1/2, up 1 1/2 points. Steels were bid up toward the close. Motors, oils, gold mining shares, copper and special issues were fractions to a point higher.

Wheat met a bit of profit-taking and then set off on another rise that carried the various positions to net gains of 1 1/2 to 1 3/4. All wheat positions were above \$1.01 a bushel. Rubber firmed about 15 points.

There was some profit-taking in stocks just before the close, notably in the silvers. Before that occurred, however, U. S. Smelting touched 113, up 2 points; American Smelting 29 1/2, up 1/2; and the preferred 128, up 1/2. Howe Sound 51 1/2, up 1/2. Pedernales Mining & Smelting which had not appeared when other silvers were soaring, made up for lost time with a gain of 10 points to 50.

Greene Cananea Copper appeared at a new high for the year of 40, up 1/2 points. Other coppers were actively traded at fractional advances with Anaconda leading.

Loading industrial stocks were firm. The farm shares strengthened with grains. Consolidated Gas closed at 22 1/2, up 1/2 in the utilities. American Telephone touched 107 1/2, up 1/2 for the day, while Western Union was 26, up 1/2, and International Telephone 71 1/2, up 1/2.

Volume approximated 700,000 shares compared with 460,000 last Saturday. Curb sales were 137,000 shares compared with 125,000 last Saturday. Dow Jones preliminary closing averages showed: Industrial 103.42, up .97; railroad 30.80, up .31; utility 17.85, up .39.

CCC PRAISED BY U. S. FORESTER
Boise, Idaho (AP)—A large volume and wide variety of work has been accomplished by CCC workers in at least four states, according to R. H. Rutledge, regional forester of Ogden, Utah.

Rutledge listed the improvements by states as:

Telephone lines built—Idaho, 255 miles; Utah, 259 miles; Wyoming, 144; Nevada, 40. Total, 798 miles.

Fences built—Idaho, 90 miles; Utah, 228 miles.

Truck Trails built into inaccessible places—Idaho, 259 miles; Utah, 627; Nevada, 87, and Wyoming, 62.

Bridges constructed—Idaho, 277; total, 605, in the four states, but number in each of the other three states not listed.

Construction of isolated cabins and other buildings—Idaho, 249; Utah, 150; Wyoming, 46, and Nevada, 18.

Wells and water holes constructed on public camping grounds and on livestock ranges total 518, of which 446 were in Idaho.

Firefighting took a total of 70,769 man days in the four states. Idaho held with 43,386 man days and Wyoming was second with 15,037 man days.

Among some 60 other projects were: rodent control, established on 1,403,873 acres, 877,385 acres of which were in Idaho, eradication of poison-plants, mapping and building dams for control of erosion.
