

WHEAT CONTROL VOTE WILL GET ACTION IN POLK

Dallas—The first meeting in the nationwide wheat referendum will be held at Perrydale Monday evening. Wheat growers from all communities along the north side of Polk county are expected to attend. A. R. Shumway, prominent wheat grower of Umatilla county, will be the speaker. Meetings in the other districts of the county will be held during the week following.

Officers and committeemen of the Polk county wheat production control association met in the courthouse at Dallas last week and laid plans and reported that the wheat section wanted a special effort made to get out a large vote. Not only farmers who have wheat contracts can vote at this election, but also all other bona fide wheat growers, stated Beck.

The question to be voted on is "Are you in favor of a wheat production adjustment program to follow the present one, which expires with the 1935 crop year?"

Other meetings for the rest of the county were scheduled. Following the Perrydale meeting the next one will be held at the Monmouth city hall May 8. One the evening of May 9 growers of the seventh district will meet in the Independence city hall. Monday night, May 13, another meeting will be held in the Lewisville schoolhouse and the final session will be Tuesday evening, May 14, at the Rickreall grange hall.

All wheat growers are urged to attend these meetings and take part in the voting, according to H. H. Brant, president of the county wheat growers. "Farmers should remember that if they want to vote on this question they should attend the meeting in their district," he stated.

SUMMER SESSION PLANS ANNOUNCED

Monmouth—A six week's summer session, followed by a five week's session, forming together a full summer quarter, is announced by President J. A. Churchill of the Oregon Normal school. The dates will be from June 10 to August 23.

POLK SPEAKERS WILL COMPETE IN TWO CITIES

Independence—The Polk county high school declamatory contest will be held at Falls City May 15, and at Monmouth May 16, beginning sharply at 8 o'clock. The contest is divided into four divisions and each high school is allowed one representative in each.

The dramatic and humorous divisions will be held at the Falls City school and the oratorical and extemporaneous divisions at Monmouth. The subject for extemporaneous speaking is "Social Insurance." The Independence high school will be represented in this division by Robert Farmer. Contestants for the other three are as follows: Oratorical, to be selected; humorous, Joan Dickerson; dramatic, Muriel Cooper.

The three judges will base their decisions on the selections, which cannot exceed 15 minutes in length, on the difficulty of the selections, memory work, expression, poise and delivery, and will vote by listing the contestants according to individual preference. A cup will be awarded the school having the most points, and ribbons to individual winners.

Any student regularly enrolled in a Polk county high school is eligible when chosen by their teachers to represent their school. However, when a contestant has won first place he is not allowed to compete in the same division again.
