

SCHOOL SYSTEM FOR SILVERTON GIVEN HONORS

Silverton—To be ranked one of a choice of 40 outstanding schools in the United States is the honor accorded Robert Goetz, superintendent of the present system, which he has perfected. Silverton is the choice of the northwestern schools.

The communication was recently received from Carl A. Jensen of the United States department of the interior, office of Education, Washington, D. C., and was in the nature of the possibility of a proposed survey of the youth in Silverton of the ages of 16 to 24. This is an attempt to select 60 communities of various sizes, conditions and geographical locations which, taken together, will give a reliable picture or series of pictures of youth in the United States.

The communication stated that Silverton was selected in the national sampling on the recommendation of national and state educational authorities. Goetz has expressed his acceptance of the plan.

The survey is to be carried on with the summer. The work will consist of preparing a youth census schedule with information of the problems and conditions he has to face with the idea of federally bettering his chances in a social and educational way.
