BAKER LAMENTS OREGON APATHY PWA PROJECTS

If the citizens of Oregon are content to sit back while others are taking advantage of the opportunity offered by the government in distribution of money they are "just plain damn fools," George L. Baker, manager of the Oregon Manufacturers' association and former mayor of Portland, told the chamber of commerce Monday noon.

"I am a republican by affiliation but I have no objection to spending democratic money for the development of the state," he declared. "The money is available and will be spent regardless and we do not want to sit down while others are grabbing the coin."

Baker criticized those who condemn the government for its expenditures and bemoan the fact that the money must in a portion be repaid at some future date. More people oppose proposed projects than approve them, he said. If the people of the state, by unified action can agree, then developments will continue.

The speaker also touched upon the national housing show to be held in Portland May 25 to June 2, including the "house of magic" brought intact from the Chicago world's fair, and also upon the meeting of the Greater Willamette Valley association to be held here Tuesday evening. He closed with the statement that between 25 and 50 linen mills in the valley are not impossibilities with the development of the Oregon flax industry and held that what the state needs most is men of vision and courage.

LONGSHOREMEN ON TRIAL FOR ASSAULT

Portland, May 13 (AP)—Art Shearer, one of 32 longshoremen indicted on riot and assault charges growing out of an attack on an opposition longshoremen's hiring hall here last Aug. 20, went on trial in circuit court today for felonious riot. He was the first of the group to go on trial.

James Conner, 20, of Corvallis, who was in the Columbia River Longshoremen's Association hiring hall when longshoremen stormed the place, was shot to death during the riot. It has not been determined whether the shot was fired from inside or outside the hall.

PHONE COMPANY CAN'T BE COERCED

The state of Oregon does not have the constitutional right to force a telephone company to furnish service over a proposed private telephone exchange for state offices, the attorney general ruled today.

The opinion, requested by the board of control, held however the state and company could enter into a contract, but should the company refuse the right of coercion was doubted. The opinion stated such a movement "would subject the company to arbitrary and unreasonable requirements in connection with furnishing service over facilities which it did not own, and over which it did not have any direct control, as a result of which its ability to render adequate service to customers would be impaired with resulting loss of business."

The board has contemplated installation of a private exchange for use of all state offices and departments and the utilities commission requested the board to seek an opinion as to how far the state could go in that respect.

CHILD WELFARE WORK INCREASES

Immunization and child welfare work in the state has exceeded anything in previous years, according to the May report of Dr. Laban Steeves, of Salem, grand medicine of the 40 st society of the American Legion. To date 4583 contacts have been made including those handled by the Klamath Falls volunteer in that district which includes northern California.

The report includes 800 Schick tests given at Astoria as a check on the inoculations given last year; Medford 560 smallpox; Yreka, Cal. 700 diphtheria; Lakeview 420 diphtheria; Tule Lake 342 typhoid; Chemawa (Salem Indian school) 309 diphtheria; Altamont 46 diphtheria; Marshfield 52 diphtheria and smallpox; Oregon City 20 diphtheria; Sacred Heart academy (Salem) 56 diphtheria; Powers 95 diphtheria and smallpox; Chillicothe 96 diphtheria; Malin 100 typhoid; Merrill 100 typhoid; Bonville 125 diphtheria; Grants Pass 130 smallpox; Klamath Falls 200 diphtheria; Millington 200 diphtheria and smallpox; North Bend 226 diphtheria and smallpox; Eugene and Jefferson each two dental treatments.

Serum for the work is provided by the different vultures of the state and grand vulture for children whose parents are financially unable to provide the protection. County health nurses and Legionnaire physicians direct the work where there is no vulture.

District Attorney Trindle stated recently that it was likely the grand jury would complete that share of its investigations when the audit of the sheriff's books is completed. This has been under charge of the state auditing department on request of the jury and it is understood has been carried back into the terms of the incumbent's predecessor, Sheriff Bower.

The regular jury was continued some time ago to May 27 due to the fact that the term in Albany was being carrying over past the regular time.

MORGENTHAU TO SPEAK ON RADIO

Washington, May 13 (AP)—Strict secrecy was maintained today concerning an address by Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., tonight on "The American dollar."

It was hinted, however, that the address might contain an important pronouncement regarding monetary policies. It will be broadcast over a national hookup at 10 p. m. EST. Beyond the treasury's announcement the speech would be a review of new deal monetary policy there was no indication of its contents. There appeared to be unusual secrecy surrounding the speech.

Business houses of Salem and their employees were urged to give fullest cooperation and support to Poppy Day, to be observed here and throughout the nation Saturday, May 25th, in a statement issued today by Howard Hulsey, president of the chamber of commerce. Pointing out the patriotic significance of the poppy Mr. Hulsey asked that the poppy be worn generally in all places of business and that every aid be extended to the volunteer workers of the American Legion Auxiliary who will distribute the little paper flowers of remembrance. The statement said:

"Members of the Salem chamber of commerce always have been among the foremost to answer any civic or patriotic call. During the World War some served with the armed forces while others did their part in services at home. They remember and honor the sacrifices of those who gave up their lives in the nation's defense, of those who were disabled in war service, and those who lost sons, husbands or fathers.

"Therefore, I am calling upon all members to observe Poppy Day, Saturday, May 25th, by wearing the memorial poppy of the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary, by encouraging their employees to wear the paper poppy while on duty, and by extending every courtesy and cooperation to the patriotic women of the American Legion Auxiliary who will distribute the flowers.

WHEAT PACT MAY BE SIGNED TUESDAY

Spokane, Wash., May 13 (AP)—The long-pending wheat marketing agreement between the North Pacific emergency export corporation and the AAA, Orris Dorman, president of the export corporation, said late Saturday, probably will be signed Tuesday in Portland.

Dorman will leave here today to meet with the export board. He said the agreement had been in his office a week, but was held up pending further advice from Washington about putting the agreement into operation. None came.

Information from the capitol led Dorman to believe the AAA has changed its intention of moving wheat from this area to middle west drought areas for feed. He considered it probable the wheat might be diverted to food purposes by the FERA.

MORE PLANTS CLOSED BY LUMBER STRIKE

Portland, May 13 (AP)—Two Portland woodworking plants employing about nine hundred workers closed today as a result of the widespread lumber strike in the Pacific northwest. The plants were the Western Co-operative company and the Ply-Lock Corporation. The co-operative company officials said that although the workers were not organized in union, the presence of a large number of pickets "discouraged the men from working."

At the Plylock yesterday it was said employees voted yesterday to strike. They placed pickets at the factory this morning.

BOY ON BICYCLE DIES IN ACCIDENT

Medford, Ore., May 13 (AP)—Francis Friley, 12, boy bicyclist, was killed late yesterday as the result of an automobile accident on the Jacksonville-Medford highway when an auto driven by Joseph Wilson, hooked the front wheel of another car driven by Jacob Lemely. The Friley youth and another boy were riding down the highway when the Wilson car attempted to pass the Lemely auto. The Lemely auto was thrown into the youth when the wheels became entangled. Young Friley died at a local hospital a few hours later.

Boston, May 13 (AP)—Half-hour clanging of a bell in the African Methodist Episcopal church disturbed William Shaw, Jr., 28.

At 2 a. m., Shaw, clad in pajamas, walked across the street kicked through a window in the church, climbed to the belfry and "disabled" the bell hammer.

Shaw, arrested, said he wanted only sleep.

He got his wish, sleeping soundly in a cell for 10 hours.

3 FATALITIES MEDFORD AREA

Medford, Ore., May 13 (AP)—Three fatalities marked the week-end in the Rogue river valley.

Lloyd Johnson, 28, of Yreka, Calif., was drowned Sunday afternoon in enigrant dam near Ashland, when the motor boat in which he was riding overturned. Johnson is believed to have been struck on the head when the capsizing occurred. His body was recovered three hours later. He had removed the life belt he was wearing just before the fatal trip.

Francis Friley, 12, a boy bicyclist, died last night from injuries he sustained Sunday afternoon, when he was caught in an auto accident between two autos on the Medford-Jacksonville highway Sunday afternoon.

J. J. Smith was killed in an altercation at Ashland with John Roth of Bangor, Maine. The quarrel culminated a dispute over how the evening meal was to be cooked. Roth is alleged to have hit Smith in the head with a piece of timber, when he knocked down and kicked by Smith. Both men are transients.

According to a statement given the state police by Roth, Smith threatened to "cut my head off with a razor, and then knocked me down and kicked." Roth's statement then recites that he picked up the club, and hit Smith once on the head.

OKLAHOMA NEGRO GIVEN NEW TRIAL

Washington, May 13 (AP)—Again applying its ruling in the celebrated Scottsboro case that negroes could not be excluded from juries, the supreme court today set aside a death sentence imposed on Jess Hollins, Oklahoma negro convicted of criminal assault on a white woman.

The case was sent back to lower courts for further proceedings. It means a new trial unless prosecution is dropped.

Chief Justice Hughes read the unanimous opinion.
