## Moss Lake Attracting Many Local Residents Who Brave Short Hike

Silverton—Moss lake is not generally known to tourists or the local public in its true value as only a few care to brave the trail of perhaps two miles from the main road, but of several square yards yet showing a surface of water.

The moss is not unlike that growing on fallen logs in the timber areas on the surface, but underneath and on down to the depth of water the formation of moss is compact and spongy and of a deep red and rust color. Myriads of fronds with roots of the tiny elongations seem to bind the spongy mass together. The surface color is velvety green. The growth is so dense that the visitor may walk over it without danger, though a springiness underneath keeps one wondering, and if he becomes playful and jumps, he is apt to sink into the mass to an uncanny depth. A gas formation under the heavy surface is evidenced by punching a long stick through the moss and witnessing a flame when a lighted match is applied over the opening.

Reports are verified that a medicinal quality is contained in the under moss which is dried and used for surgical dressings. The deep red color becomes a grey cream shade when dried and the composition easily crumbles into powder.

The boys of the visiting party declare fish abound in the lake that is yet of surface value though the approach to the water shore is hazardous as one sinks rapidly if he stand inert.
