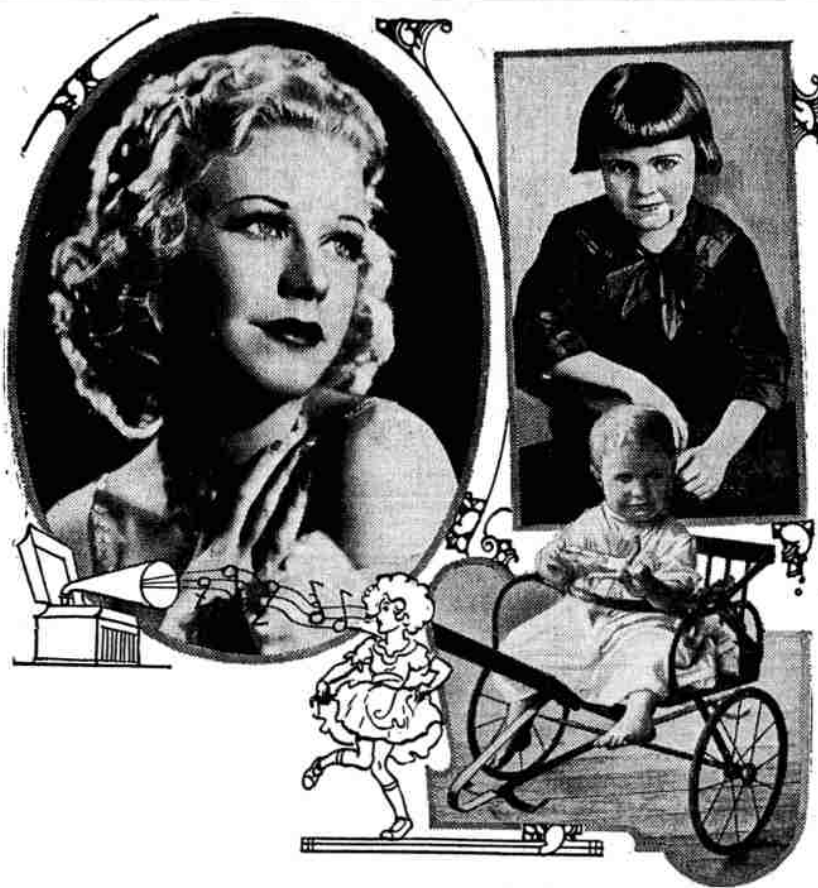
DECORATING SCHOOL

DALLAS SENIOR CLASS SECOND LARGEST UNIT

Dallas—An audience packed the high school auditorium Thursday night to hear Dr. Bruce R. Baxter, president of Willamette University, deliver the commencement address to the second largest graduating class in the history of the school.

To the strains of the professional, played by Elsie McPetridge 37, the graduates, 52 in number, passed from the rear of the auditorium down the center aisle to their places on the stage. The invocation was delivered by the Rev. Dean Vermillion, pastor of the Evangelical church. The first number on the program was a violin duet played by Dorothy Palmer 36, and Margaret Riggs 37, accompanied by Doris Riggs 36 at the piano.

This was followed by Dr. Baxter who had selected as the theme of his talk, "What Next." His address was particularly interesting in view of what he termed the "shrinking" world along the lines of transportation and communication illustrated very adequately by means of realistic word pictures and his experiences as a world traveler in South Africa and the South Sea Islands.

The boys' quartet, composed of Walter Fries 35, Lester Voth 37, Charles Harris 37 and Stanley Turrell 35, Lester presented the number "Short'n' Bread." They were accompanied at the piano by Miss Ida Miller.

The awarding of scholarships and prizes was entrusted to S. E. Whitworth, principal of the high school. He announced Miss Harriett Lockling as the winner of a scholarship to Maryhurst college, a scholarship to Howard Campbell from the Washington and Lee university and Clark DeHaven, Robert Harris and Gerald Vinton as the three winners of the Carl Gerlinger vocational training prizes. These prizes are \$25, \$15 and \$10 respectively.

The next number on the program was a vocal solo by Mary Staats 35. She was accompanied by Mrs. Robert Kutch, R. R. Turner, superintendent of the city schools, presenting the diplomas to the class. In the course of his remarks he pointed out that the number of boys in the graduating classes invariably exceeded the number of girls. This was regarded generally as a tribute to the school spirit and the educational facilities available. The benediction was pronounced by Lloyd L. Rice, pastor of the Christian Alliance Tabernacle.
