D. A. R. Regent Speaks To Group

Albany—Mrs. Mark V. Weatherford, state regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, told an audience here in honor of Flag day that never before has the American flag stood in greater danger and never has the need for Americanism been so keen.

Communism is striking at the very vitals of the United States, Mrs. Weatherford said, and is enveloping the youth of the land. Almost every school of higher learning in the country has felt the poisonous sting of communism, she said, influencing the obliteration of American fathers and heroic dead from the memories of youth.

The antidote, Mrs. Weatherford said, is united, steadfast and immobile resistance to red propaganda on the part of loyal Americans who are aware of its incursions, exposure of its perpetrators and the spreading of the gospel of Americanism.
