SERA PROJECTS APPROVED

Albany—Two SERA projects were approved by the Lynn county relief committee subject to approval by the state relief committee. One project calls for clearing, grubbing and grading of the Ames creek road east of Scio. A total of \$3420 is to be provided, including \$1193.20 SERA labor and \$1537.20 local contributions. The other project involves \$23 to be provided entirely from SERA funds for continuation of employment of a cook and laundress from May 27 to September 5. The local SERA office received \$5180 from the state liquor commission fund this week. This money is more than adequate to complete half of its May budget requirements.

LIQUOR NOT BLAMED

Albany—Gust Schelman, arrested recently on a charge of drunken driving, was acquitted in justice court Wednesday. A jury found him not guilty. Schelman's defense was that he is suffering from a dislocated back which causes him to walk and act in such a manner as to give a false impression. 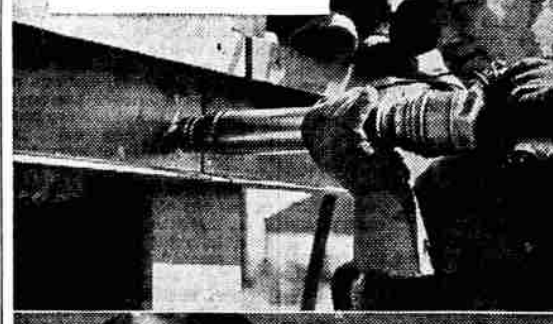
