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SCHOOL BOARD FAVORS FUNDS FOR BUILDING

Albany, Or. — Albany's school board unanimously voted Wednesday to proceed with necessary steps toward securing PWA aid in the erection of two new grade school buildings and expansion of the Albany high school building. Several tentative plans were taken under advisement.

Action was taken after the board entertained a petition signed by 400 property owners of school district No. 5 asking that the board take such action toward replacing antiquated school structures. It was revealed at the meeting that the school board has had in mind erection of new school buildings for the last three months.

It was definitely decided to call an election for approval of a proposed bond issue not to exceed \$150,000 of which 55 per cent of \$82,500 would actually be charged against the district, the remaining 45 per cent of \$47,500 to be a grant from PWA funds.

Albany's cost per dollar for carrying the additional indebtedness would be but \$1.45, as compared with the cost of \$2.48 for the Albany high school bond issue and \$1.725 for the Madison school issue.

Of seven cities in the Willamette valley as far north as Oregon City, Albany pays the lowest school tax, excepting Oregon City and The Dalles. Albany also ranks high in all other financial comparisons.

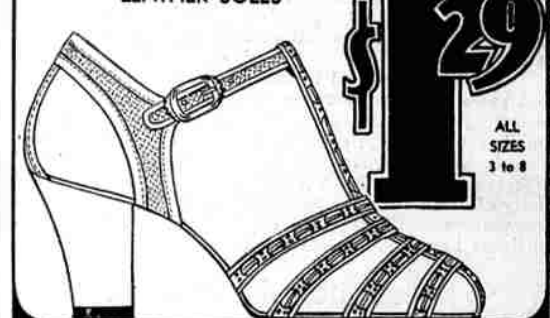
Directing Hospital

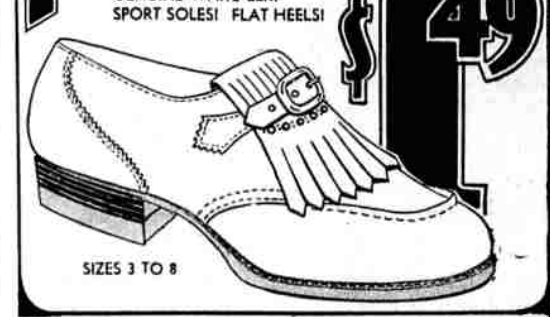
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
