

COUNTY CLAIMS AGAINST BANK START MONDAY

Albany—Linn county's claims against the defunct First National bank of Albany will be presented to the federal court Monday at a hearing scheduled to start at 10 a.m. with Special Master and Chancellor David B. Evans, appointed by Judge McNary of the federal court at Portland hearing the claims, according to C. C. Bryant, receiver for the bank, as plaintiff and the Linn county officers as defendants.

The defendants are R. M. Russell, individually and as county clerk of Linn county; Herbert Shelton, individually and as county sheriff, and Grover C. Nance, individually and as county treasurer. The U. S. National bank of Portland is also named as a defendant. The hearing is scheduled to take place in the law library of the First National bank.

This hearing will bring to an issue a temporary injunction granted June 18, 1934, by the federal court, restraining the county from selling two Klamath county permanent road bonds of \$1000 par value each, which had been put up among others by the bank prior to the time the bank went into receivership, and prior to March 1, 1933, as security for county funds.

Specifically the funds involved are a clerk's account of \$7860.82, a sheriff's account of \$6785.76, and a special sheriff's account of \$462, totaling \$8044.57. The county contends that the sheriff's and clerk's funds are public funds and that the bank's security was put up to cover all public funds. Therefore, these accounts are entitled to preference.

The dispute started in 1934 when County Treasurer Nance refused to surrender to the bank receiver \$42,500 par value bonds which had been deposited by the bank to secure county deposits.

On June 18, 1934, bonds from this group totaling \$40,500 in par value were sold by the county treasurer for \$39,448.58. From the proceeds of this sale the treasurer's account of \$31,364.15 was paid, leaving a balance of \$8084.43 which is now held in escrow at the U. S. National bank in Portland.

Disposal of the injunction will be determined by Monday's hearing. Should the case be decided in the county's favor the county will be reimbursed to the extent of \$8044.57, the principal claimed due.

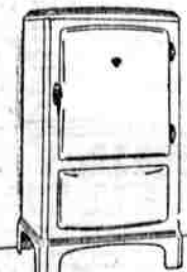
PLAN SUPERVISED PLAY
Albany—Playground activities in Albany are scheduled to start June 17. It was announced by a committee comprised of Albany Parent-Teacher association council and the American Legion auxiliary, who will work with an Albany and Linn county committee. Under the plan a supervisor is to be employed at the expense of a municipal body or bodies, which in this case will be the city and the school district dividing the cost. Under the supervisor from eight to 10 recreational workers will be employed, their salaries to be paid from SERA funds, from whose rolls their names will be taken.

Lewis was arrested by Lane county officers and turned over to Sheriff Shelton. For lack of bond Lewis is in the Linn county jail.

SLOUGH YIELDS BRODIE'S BODY AFTER SEARCH

Albany—The body of William Brodie, 79, Corvallis, was found in a marshy slough near the junction of the Peoria-Albany and Albany-Corvallis road on the west side of the Willamette river Friday by State Police Officer Walter Winters and Brodie's son, John of Albany, after he had been sought for several days. The body was found a quarter of a mile from the highway, where it was presumed the elderly man had become exhausted and fallen down and was unable to arise.

As had been Brodie's habit, he left home Monday morning for his son's home in Albany. He planned to hitch hike to Albany and when he didn't arrive here after the son had learned his father had started on the trip and had not reached Albany, a search was started.

Farmers along the highway reported they had seen Brodie walking along the road and Mr. Bogie, a farmer of the Orleans community, stated he had seen Brodie Monday traversing the highway, but that Brodie seemed to be having difficulty in walking.

Brodie is survived by his widow, his son here and a son in Corvallis, and a daughter, Mrs. Walter Smith of Peoria. It was the opinion of officers that he had not met foul play, but had died from exhaustion.
