

NINE YOUTHS QUALIFY FOR FFA DEGREE

The June meeting of Salem chapter, Future Farmers of America, was held at the home of R. L. Morgan, 1905 North Fifth street Wednesday evening.

During the business meeting a number of boys met the qualifications for the second degree or Future Farmer. In order to qualify for this degree they must have productively invested \$25 or more, be regularly enrolled in vocational agriculture with an amplified supervised practice program, be able to lead a group discussion for 10 minutes, and receive the majority votes of the members present at a regular chapter meeting.

sey cow and one acre truck crops.

Virgil Trick, Jersey cow and 100 baby chicks.

Chris Bartruff, one acre bearing loganberries.

Elmer McCloughy, three and one-half acres onions.

Richard Batdorf, three acres field corn.

Robert Rullison, three acres of filberts.

As a part of the F. F. A. program of work is a three day project tour and camping trip and to meet this requirement it was decided to make a combined educational tour and camping trip. The boys will leave Saturday, June 22 stopping at the various F. F. A. chapters en route to the Tillamook and Lincoln county beaches where they will remain over the week-end.

Plans were made to enter the dairy cow cost of production contest and egg laying contest held in connection with the state chapter, Future Farmers of America, at the state fair. A number of the boys are planning to build and enter the farm shop exhibits.

The chapter accepted Homer Zielinski's invitation to hold the July meeting at his home Thursday, July 11.

Making Pot-Likker is Described by Huey for Uplift of Congressmen

Washington, June 13 (U.P.)—Senator Huey Long digressed far from NRA in his filibuster, discussing his uncle, the bible, historical figures, General Hugh S. Johnson, and his favorite recipes. His recipes included pot likker, fried oysters, and Roquefort cheese salad dressing. He said:

"Pot-likker is the residue and remains from the cooking and heating and the evaporation of vegetables. It is all left in the bottom of the pot.

"Here's how it is made. You take greens, and Mr. President, you've got to wash greens.

"That's the first thing you do—wash the turnips and greens. Then you put 'em in the pot. But remember—don't salt 'em.

"Don't pepper 'em. Don't put vinegar on 'em. Don't put any seasoning on 'em.

"Then put in there a piece of salted side meat, sliced just down to the skin part." At this point, Long paused to decide the proper amount of meat to use.

NARROW ESCAPE FOR J. B. SWANEY

In a double accident involving three automobiles J. B. Swaney, Portland, had a narrow escape from death and his wife received head cuts about 10 o'clock Wednesday night near the Checkerboard service station north on the Pacific highway.

Swaney was driving north when he collided head-on with a south-bound machine driven by Guy N. Aupperle, Jefferson route 1. Both machines were badly damaged, the left front wheels locking together in the crash.

While directing traffic around the Swaney machine, which was almost in the center of the highway, Sergeant Powell Clayton, state police, attempted to slow down a speeding machine which failed to heed his signals. Standing with Powell was Swaney, who was struck on the foot by the other automobile driven by George W. Roberts, Salem route 7, Box 55. He was knocked against his own wrecked car but was not seriously injured. Roberts crashed into the rear of the Aupperle machine, doing considerable damage and tearing off the fender of his own car.

fast as we can elect them," Dr. Davis continued.

It was rumored today that certain persons, disgruntled because of her stand in stamping out secret society activities in the high school, were making a campaign against Mrs. David Wright, chairman of the board. Just which one of the other three candidates the pro-society folk were backing was not determined, although rumor again pointed toward Copper.

Dr. B. F. Pound, incumbent, and Prof. Herman Clark of Willamette university are the other candidates. In seeking reelection Dr. Pound points to his record as a member of a board which has "carried on its work efficiently."

Professor Clark declared he believes the public school should "teach good citizenship, develop in youngsters appreciation of our government, its problems, standards and structure, and build good moral character."

The election will take place next Monday between the hours of 2 and 7 p. m., with one polling place—the administration building on North High street.

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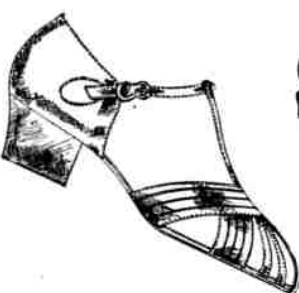
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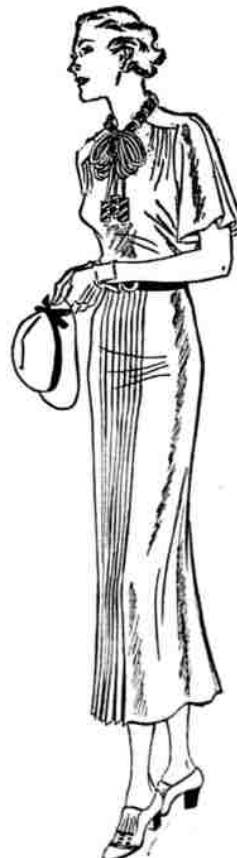
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
